Government Weekly Summary Reports that
Seedling is Well Advanced.

EUROPE GETS WHEAT OUTSIDE AMERICA

This Country Now Fourth Source of
Supply, but Russia, India and
Australia Equip the
Market.

OMAHA, May 10, 1904.
The grain speculators were waiting the
government report, which was issued at
10 o'clock. The Washington weekly sum-
mary issued at noon reports the spring
wheat seedling largely finished except in
the west lands at the north of North Dakota
and Minnesota. The early sowing in the
southern portion has made good progress.
The winter wheat has generally improved
in condition, especially in the western and
the mid-Atlantic states. The Ohio valley
continues poor. Corn planting is reported
progressing well in Nebraska, Kansas, and
Northern Missouri where rain hindered
work. Iowa corn planting is practically
finished and the work is earlier than in
the central valley and middle At-
lantic states, but in the southern Atlantic
and the Gulf states, where it is
heading the outlook is poor.

The London Bulletin for this summary is
bearing. It says the fact that America and
Canada are now fourth in two sources of
supply in the face of the liberal Argentine
and Russian shipments and the expected
abundance in Australia, India and
Australia. It estimates the exportable surplus in southern
Australia at 4,000,000 bushels and for
