Dollar wheat again today. The shorts are stampeded. Surprise grows at the continued buillen marget and everyone expects a reaction. The wheat has gone up in a few days 6 cents. This is in the face of perfect weather, which while co much to change the untavorable prospect of a few weeks ago, of the unprecedentedly bad flour situation which decreases by almost half the consumption of wheat in Minneapolls, and lastly of the almost absolute lack of interest on the part of European markets and of a foreign demand so small the entire seaboard has shipped during April only 290,000 bushels. It is pointed out the general condition and the world's supply are such as to make continued prices such as have ruled for several days impossible. Duluth has been practically shut out of the market by the suspension of lake traffic by the regular lines. The Buffaio elevator men have struck and added to the tieup. This has thrown all the sastern business on Chicago, and the wheat is going out at not less than 100,000 bushels daily and more would go if beats could be obtained. While some of the speculators take the larger view of the condition, some are busy taking the contract wheat at Minneapolis and Chicago. The stock at the former city has decreased \$50,000 bushels so far this week and the latter will not last more than ten days. Omaha and Council Huffs elevators hold 16,382 bushels of wheat, but the amount of contract stuff is supposed to be small.

"I have just been over the country around Creston and Red Oak," said a cash corn man, "and the people there are certainly bius. They have no corn and are buying it from us here and from east of them.
