DEATH DUE TO HER OWN ACT

Coroner's Jury in Case of Mrs. Moran Brings in Verdict of Suicide.

NO NEW LIGHT ON THE OCCURRENCE

Father Instructs Undertaker to Send Remains of Unfortunate Woman to Her Old Home for Burial.

That the woman came to her death by a self-inflicted pistol wound was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest held yesterday afternoon by Coroner Treynor over Mrs. Moran, who died early Sunday morning at the Woman's Christian Association hospital. The witnesses were Police Officer Busse and O'Neil, City Physician Cliney and W. G. Worth, the barber who roomed with the woman.

Worth, who gave his testimony in a somewhat diffident manner and appeared to be particularly anxious to conceal his relationship with the dead woman, denied having had any quarrel with Mrs. Moran, but thought she was worrying because her husband would not live with her. This was the only reason he could ascribe for her wishing to take her life. At first he said he had been rooming with Mrs. Moran since last December, but in answer to the question of one of the jurors admitted that he also roomed with her when she occupied apartments on South Main street. He told of the woman's husband visiting her Friday, May 13, and said that they quarreled that afternoon. He said he was the only 'roomer' Mrs. Moran had.

Regarding the shooting Worth said he had an indistinct recollection of someone opening his door and saying 'good-by,' but he was sleepy and paid little attention to it. A few seconds later he was startled by the sound of the shot and hastened to the woman's room, only to find the doors locked. He then dressed and notified the police. In answer to a question of the jury he said he had seen the revolver with which Mrs. Moran shot herself in her possession, which was taken by Detective Callahan, who examined the woman's apartments after the shooting. The officers testified to breaking in the door of the woman's room and finding her lying across the bed. Dr. Tinley testified as to the nature of the wound and to having assisted at the post mortem examination held by Coroner Treynor yesterday afternoon at the coroner's office.

The body will be sent today to the woman's former home in Scott, England, at the request of her father, W. H. Stull, who telegraphed instructions yesterday to Undertaker Cutler.

MARTIN PERJURY CASE ON TRIAL

Evidence of State About All in an Adjudgment of Court.

The trial of M. F. Martin, a well known resident of Omaha, in an indictment charging him with committing perjury, began in the district court this morning. The evidence for the state was about all in when court adjourned for the day.

The perjury is alleged to have been committed by Martin during the course of the trial of a suit in the district court here some time ago, in which Martin was plaintiff and John Hutcheon and others, defendants. The suit was over a roadway through property of the defendants leading to Martin's land.

Mr. Mabe E. Wright was granted a writ of habeas corpus, and George Wright, his minor child, on the grounds of failure to support. They were married January 27, 1920. Wright's share in the transaction being to avoid prosecution on a criminal charge. He was subsequently arrested for trying to avoid the responsibility of the minor child, and was confined in the district court, where he was promised matters by agreeing to pay so much a week toward the support of his wife and baby. He kept up the payments for a short time only.

The trial of J. L. Price, charged with writing a check, which was assigned for recovery in the district court, was continued at the request of the defendant, who claimed he was unable to secure the attendance of an important witness at this time.

Motions for new trials have been filed in the suits of J. L. Mathis against the Aetna Life Insurance company, and George Ouderkirk against the Peffer and Schoen company. In the first case by the defendant company and in the second by the plaintiff.

Mrs. Mary F. Hayes brought suit in the district court yesterday for divorce from Captain W. H. Hayes, who was confined some months ago to the State Hospital for Diplopia, and at that time contracted his escape and returned to his home here. Hayes was arrested last week, charged with intoxication and disturbing the peace of the neighborhood, and was committed to the penitentiary for a term of one year and a day. Hayes is now in the penitentiary, and his wife is now in the State Hospital for Diplopia.

IOWA BOY HANDS GO TO PRISON

Youths Who Served Time in Reform School Go to Penitentiary.

DES MOINES, May 23.—James Sullivan and William Hayes, aged respectively 15 and 16, were sentenced to the penitentiary for a term of one year and a day each for burglary. Sullivan and Hayes are reform school graduates and leaders of a gang of boys in the vicinity of the city within the last three months. Their robberies and petty larcenies have been so frequent that length of time more than thirty cases, from house-breaking to highway holdups.

IOWA FARMER COMMITS SUICIDE

Paralytic Ends Life by Hanging at His Home in Page County.

CLARINDA, Ia., May 23.—(Special Telegram.)—John Maxwell, a middle-aged man, a farmer by occupation, committed suicide by hanging himself in the barn on his farm in Buchanan township, Page county, Sunday forenoon. He had been stricken with paralysis, was partially helpless and could not speak. It is believed his mind had become deranged. He is survived by his wife and children.
