Governor Cummins Makes Argument for Iowa Regiments at Shiloh.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) DES MOINES, May 21 .- (Special.) - Govrnor Cummins will return home from Shiloh tomorrow. He went with the lows members of the monument commission to meet on the scene of the battle the members of the national commission which has charge of the construction of monuments on the battlefields and to present to them the facts regarding the Fifteenth and Sixteenth lows regiments of volunteers in that battle. The members of the commission participated in the battle and gave information in regard to the movements of their regiments on the field which contradicted the official history as the commissioners have approved it. The governor delivered an argument of nearly three hours in relation to the matter and the members of the lowa commission believe that he demonstrated to the satisfaction of all that the two regiments named really took part in the fight. The evidence and the arguments will be transcribed here and be forwarded to Washington for the perusal of the president and secretary of war. The history of the two regiments as it is found in the official records does not correspond with the facts because the two regiments were fresh on the field and had not been placed under any brigade commander hence their record was not kept.

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
