

He repeated his former, actions upon arrival home Monday evening, driving his wife und children from home, with the exception of one son, whom he seemed to favor and did

not fight. His threats of violence to all were indulged in and he added the feature of trying repeatedly to set things about the place on fire, the son watching him closely

and extinguishing fires if he started them or preventing him from starting them. Later in the night Mr. Kluck went to the hayloft, worn out with his revelries, to sleep off his drunkenness. No further attention was paid to him until toward 9 o'clock the next morning, although he was heard talking to himself at about breakfast time, it being presumed that he would get

down to breakfast. On going to him he was seen to be in an unusual condition and it was discovered that he had taken poison, from the effects of which he died early in the day.
