

FIND TICKET IS ONE-SIDED

Democrats Think They Will Have to Make New Legislative Nominations.

MAKE A MESS IN THE CONVENTION

No Labor Representative and too Many Religionists of Same Kind—Burkley Will Not Run for Senator.

The democrats of Douglas county are in trouble, and the worst of it is they do not seem to be able to tell just how they are going to get out. The difficulty arises over the nominations of the county convention of candidates for the legislature. It is said that out of the twelve candidates nominated nine of them belong to one religious denomination, and an oversight was made by not placing a representative of the labor vote in the lineup.

Already it has become known that Frank Z. Burkley, nominated for senator, refuses to accept the nomination. This has caused considerable solicitude of itself. Shortly after the convention some astute individual discovered the state of affairs existing and hurried to his leaders with a tale of woe. Since that time numerous democrats, it is said, have voted the sentiment that the legislative ticket can never be elected unless some changes are made. But there the difficulty arises. There seems to be no way of changing the ticket unless some of the candidates can be prevailed on to resign, and all of them are yearning for a term in the law-making body of the state.

"Who is the man that is willing to sacrifice his ambitions upon the altar of the party?" That is the question which is daily asked, and to the answer cometh not. But something must be done, that is certain. Of course the filling of vacancies upon the ticket, caused by resignations, if there are any, will be in the hands of the county committee and that committee is waiting with bated breath, for some of the candidates to speak and proclaim to all the world that he is the man who lays down his ambitions.

Some Named by Accident.

A well defined rumor has got abroad in the land that the candidates on the ticket, at least some of them, got there by accident and that if the state had not been broken in the convention the result of the nominations would have been otherwise. One well posted democrat said if a state is made and broken the convention is not responsible for the ticket which comes out of the mill, and thus the members of the convention are not taking the blame for the result of the nominations very much to heart, but are waiting for developments simply as on-lookers.

C. J. Smyth, candidate for district delegate to the national democratic convention, said: "The men on the ticket are all good men and while I believe there will be some changes in the ticket before the election, I do not believe that it will be improved upon very much. I do not know there will be any withdrawals, but I understand there is likely to be a revision of the legislative ticket. There is ample time, however, for that between this and election and I do not believe the matter has been considered to any great extent by anyone. I had not heard before that there were so many candidates of one religious persuasion."

The ticket named by the convention is: For state senators, Frank J. Burkley; Dan Hannon, John D. Ware, for state representatives, Joseph H. Butler, N. Erick, George T. Morton, James P. Connolly, J. P. Krause, D. C. Patterson, W. P. McDewitt, Fred Bull, A. Wellman.

Specifications Being Drawn for Structure to Succeed Kountze Memorial Church.

There are now in force in this city about 100,000 policies aggregating \$2,500,000,000.
