Liabilities of mercantile tailures are com-paratively small, indicating that most con-cerns have prepared for a quiet season and are able to withstand a period of di-minished sales and tardy payments. This conservative attitude is the fundamentally strong feature of the situation, and when business revives there will be no pressure to dispose of heavy stocks of undesirable goods. me." 


