CASE OF TOO MUCH BITTERS Strange Negro Arrested with Alleged

Stolen Goods in His Pockets.

Charles Waters, colored, of Chicago drank several bumpers of bitters before breakfast Sunday morning-in fact, he almost emptied a quart bottle-and now is retiring at the city jail with the charges of drunk, carrying concealed weapons and threatening to shoot, against his name. Depth of Life in the Sea.

In the May number of the National Geographic Magazine is an interesting story of deep-sea explorations of the steamer Albatross, under the direction of the United States bureau of fisheries.

While carrying on its work the Albatross While carrying on its work the Albatross bodies have been opened up. The company has made more than 10,000 soundings and has not yet decided on the character of more than 4,000 dredgings.

The greatest depth from which the Albatross has secured any life was 4.173 fathoms. This was in the South Pacific between Tonga and Ellice islands. The dredge brought up silicious sponges, radiolarians and brown volcanic mud. The greatest depth from which it has brought up fishes is about three and one-third miles in the edge of the Gulf stream off Virginia. The deepest sounding made was at station 4010, near Guam, where the enormous depth of nearly five and one-half miles was found. The deepest sounding ever made by any vessel was by the U. S. S. Nero while on the Honolulu-Manila cable survey, with apparatus borrowed from the Albatross. When near Guam the Nero got 31,614 feet, only sixty-six feet less than six miles.
