Business Men Urge Council to Pass Ticket Brokers' Ordinance.

WANT WORLD'S FAIR TOURISTS TO STOP

Connell Does Not Promise and May Take Up Another Measure at Regular Meeting Tonight.

Wholesale men and ticket brokers contested before six members of the city council in general committee session yesterday afternoon over the anti-ticket scalping ordinance which the railroads say must be passed before they will grant stop-over privileges at Omaha on World's fair tickets. The jobbers assert that owing to the fact that Kansas City and St. Joseph have passed the ordinance the concession has been granted to both cities and travel that should come to Omaha and valuable trade resultant is being diverted. Nothing definite was decided upon by the council men, Hoye, Nicholson and O'Brien voting in favor of the ordinance and Zimman, Evans and Huntington against it.

E. E. Bruce, C. H. Pickens, T. N. Robinson, W. S. Wright, Ward Burgess, L. F. Carpenter, F. E. Sanborn, Euclid Martin and Arthur Brandels presented the jobbers' side of the story, which was to the effect that unless the scalpers' ordinance was put through they would lose thousands of dollars of business. Attorney F. S. Howell, P. H. Philbin and others represented the brokers, and said the law might put them out of business and in any event would confiscate property and damage their business. They declared the Western Passenger association was trying to use the Omaha wholesalers as

a club to exterminate the brokers. Kansas City Profits by Plan. Letters from Kansas City houses were produced showing how the Kansas City stop-over privileges are being exploited to the trade. Mr. Bruce said that the jobbers interested represented one-tenth of the taxpaying citizens and that they spend \$2,000,000 annually for the services of traveling men in the effort to bring trade here. The scalpers have prepared a substitute ordinance forbidding them to deal in World's fair transportation, but the railroads have said it won't do. The ordinance prohibited traffic in all contract, non-transferable transportation. It was said that Judge Alton B. Parker in a New York state decision had declared such a

law unconstitutional. Councilman Zimman brought up his ordinance requiring the street railway com pany to give a bond of \$10,000 for the prope protection of the streets disturbed in track laying and the procuring of permits. It was vigorously opposed by W. I. Kierstead for the street railway company, who declared the traction company always left treets in better condition than it found them and did not want to have the trouble of getting a permit every time a broken rail was replaced. Nicholson said he did ot care to vote for the ordinance until similar provisos had been prepared affecting the other public utility corporations, although Attorney Wright said the existing ordinances are sufficient. Huntington sel for Harriman and Pierce had argued and Evans, also, appeared hostile to the ordinance by itself
