

HORSE SHOW IN THE FALL

Omaha to Have the Exhibition at the Auditorium in September. WILL BE ONE OF THE AMERICAN CIRCUIT

Dr. C. De Garmo Gray Comes to Consider the Preliminary Arrangements and Pronounces Outlook Satisfactory.

Dr. C. De Garmo Gray of St. Louis, resident manager of the American Horse Show association, and organizer of the American Horse Show association, is in the city, and has just completed arrangements for the Omaha horse show to take place the last week in September at the Auditorium, under the auspices of the Omaha Horse Show association.

The prizes will aggregate \$10,000 and the leading show stables of America will be represented at the exposition. Among the stables to exhibit at the show will be those of H. C. Crane of St. Charles, Ill.; W. G. Carling of St. Paul, Minn.; J. D. McArdie of Minneapolis; Augustus Busch of St. Louis; Thomas Bass of Mexico, Mo.; Winston D. Cook of Des Moines; Fred Terry of St. Joseph, Mo.; Dr. Russ of Denver; George E. Palmer, Herbert Wolf, J. D. Eubanks, W. K. Rule of Kansas City, Mo.; N. K. Herbert of Bloomington, Ill.; Willie Fisher of Springfield, Ill.; Edward Green of Milwaukee; Frederick K. Bull of Racine; Edward Maynard of Waukesha, Wis.; Simms Bros., of Chicago; P. A. Valentine of Chicago; S. H. Harris of Oconomowoc; Mr. and Mrs. Jack Cochran of Kansas City; Sidney Hartman of Louisville, Ky.; Colonel Bliss of Columbia, Mo., and a host of others of like prominence in horse show circles.

After carefully examining the Auditorium in Omaha, Dr. Gray pronounces it perfect for horse show purposes. An archway will be made at the main entrance whereby the entries can drive directly into the Auditorium and not interfere with the general public. Stable accommodations will be provided near the building, with quick hitching tents, thus enabling the entries to move in and out as rapidly as a well conducted theatrical performance.

The executive committee has decided to organize an important social function in connection with the horse show, which will be known as the Horse Show club, under the title of "Hit and Miss," members of which will be selected as associate members of the Omaha Horse Show association from among the prominent society people of Omaha, and from elsewhere throughout the states of Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri.

Dr. Gray said last evening: "Omaha is to be congratulated upon the archway which in the American Horse Show association this year, and from the outlook this early the indications are for a most promising success. Omaha is now a member of the American association, and the securing of the show here this year is the result of two years hard work, and a half a dozen visits to the city. The show will occur during Ak-Sar-Ben time. Omaha has a great many fine horses that will make a fine showing among the professional show stables, particularly in the roadster and runabout class. It is extremely rare that such large prizes are offered for a first year's meeting as are offered for the Omaha show, but having gone over the ground thoroughly, I am confident that it will be a complete success. It will be the leading social event of the season, and is one that appeals to the masses and classes, as well as to the commercial interest of the community. The American Horse Show circuit comprises the cities of Louisville, Ky.; St. Paul, Minneapolis, Kansas City, Milwaukee, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Denver, Topeka, St. Joseph, Mo., and Omaha."

The horse show will continue one week, and it is expected to be the means of attracting many visitors to the city. Horse show colors will be prevalent, mingled with the Ak-Sar-Ben colors, and the show will contribute very materially to that gala event.

Dr. Gray will leave today for St. Joseph, Topeka and St. Louis, and will return with his staff to Omaha in August to open up the permanent Horse Show headquarters and will leave no means untied to make the enterprise the most complete success.
