

GERMAN VETERANS' REUNION

Soldiers of Three Wars Brought, Sing Songs and Observe Fatherland. SOCIAL AND BENEFICIAL BUND FORMED

Parade and Picnic Today, Reception at Krug Park Monday, Many Out-of-Town Guests and Some Old Vets. German army veterans to the number of 300 gathered at Washington hall Saturday as the guests of the Omaha Landwehr Verein in the opening session of a three day reunion.

There were veterans of 1848, when Frederick IV found his kingdom torn with internal dissension; of 1866, when Prussia made its first step toward the consolidation of Germany by defeating Austria; veterans of the German-French war and also of the war with Russia. Incidentally they were all American citizens and proud of their adopted fatherland.

While glorifying in their native land and proud of its victories, the first teaching of the Landwehr constitution is in the way of advocating American citizenship. After the banquet and after roasting soldiers of German national war, a business meeting was held and a western band of the veterans was organized, with the headquarters in Omaha. It is the intention to organize local societies all over Nebraska and Iowa, to make the order not only fraternal but beneficial, and to look after the needs of the old and infirm.

President Heinrichs' Welcome. The president of the Omaha society, A. J. Morten, welcomed the guests of the association in happy terms and introduced Jacob Hauck as the chief speaker of the evening. Mr. Hauck presented the plans for the band and related many personal reminiscences.

The South Side Menace, the Orpheus Verein furnished the choral selections and the old songs sung through the hall to the accompaniment of numerous cheers and much applause. The evening was a very successful one, and the "old Kaiser" and the reigning emperor coming in for loud "hoorahs."

Among the guests of the evening were two veterans of 1848-66, C. H. Wilde and William Brunning, and three old timers according to the Omaha Landwehr Verein. Dr. Stritzman was the next in line, his period of service dating to 1856 and on the breaking out of the civil war in America the doctor became a union soldier. So that he is a veteran of two nations. P. M. Steinhauser, 78-1/2, is the proud possessor of the decorations of the Iron cross, established 1813, and given to him on the field of battle by William I for special services. Mac Helger, a 70 veteran, was also present.

Among the other veterans of 70-1 in attendance were Charles Cullen, Y. Kameinger, Jacob Killion, Frank Kilar, Jacob Knack, M. Johnson and Theodore Drieling.

ONE-LEGGED BRITISH SWIMMER

Gives Exhibition at Contest for Medal Before the Prince of Wales. LONDON, July 24.—(Special Cablegram to The Bee.)—In the pretty swimming-bath of the Bath club, Piccadilly, P. Gadsby, the one-legged swimmer, gave a short exhibition of swimming and, life-saving in the presence of the prince and princess of Wales this week.

The occasion was a swimming entertainment in aid of King Edward's hospital fund and the chief event was the final test for the silver challenge cup which was being presented to the life-saving society. The later contest was consequently anticipated with great interest, as it was generally believed that Gadsby would again prove the winner and so carry off the cup.

Gadsby, however, retired, as the breast stroke only was allowed on this occasion. The earlier part of the program included some wonderful diving and fancy swimming exhibitions by Lady Constantine Stewart-Richardson, Miss Bertha Chaplin, Miss Mair Mackenzie, and other well known women swimmers, and some high diving by some Swedish men.

The final test for the king's cup was a short and exciting one. Gadsby went the short distance, and while the bid price of the cup was \$100,000, he won it with a bushel over Jarvis's closing. The prize was presented to Gadsby by the prince and princess of Wales. Gadsby, however, retired, as the breast stroke only was allowed on this occasion.
