The men will be sworn in at the office of the sheriff in the courthouse and will be mesigned to duty at once. The sheriff has not decided what number of deputies he will put on, but will swear them in as he thinks they are needed. Late yesterday afternoon Sheriff Power issued the following mani-

Oblighta, Neb., July E, 1994.—To the Citiaens of South Omana, and Especially to Those Laborers Now on a Strike and to Their Employers: The mayer, Board of Fire and Folice Commissioners and chief of police of the city of South Omaha have called upon me to assist in preserving the peace and to pretect the persons and property of our citizens. Under the law, it is my duty to respond to this call, and i shall do so immediately by awearing in and empowering as many deputy sheriffs as I deem necessary to preserve the pulle peace.

and empowering as many deputy sheriffs as I deem necessary to preserve the pulie peace.

With the controversy now on in South Omana between organized tabor and its employers I, as sheriff, have nothing to do; but it is my duty to preserve order, and this duty. I shall perform with all the iegal means within my power.

The statutes of this state, made by the people thereof for their own protection and the protection of their property, decisive that it is illegal for any person to resort to threats, violence or acts of any litture which may disturb or endanger the public peace. The right of men to peace-ship pass to and from their work, or place of numiness, to peaceably neek work where they may and to peaceably neek work where they may and to peaceably neek work where they find it, is guaranteed by the law.

The assembling together of three or more persons upon the streets of South-Omalagua or near the packing houses with the intent to do an uniawful act is for-hidden by the statute and will not be tolerated, and the assembling of three or more for any purpose may tend to disorder and should be avoided.

Trespassing on the property of others is illegal; the throwing of switches or the breaking open of cars without authority from the railroad companies is unlawful and subjects the offenders to arrest and punishment.

All the power vested in me as sheriff

All the power vosted in me as sheriff of this county shall be used to protect the person and property of everyone in the city of South Omaha from any act of violence or disorder.

The reputation of South Omaha and all her citizens is at stake. I appeal to everyone to refrain from acts of violence or disorder and to assist me in preserving the public peace.
