CHICAGO, July 27.—Under the atimulus of a fresh burst of bullishness at Liverpool and the unsettled condition of the European political situation, the wheat market here opened strong, initial quotations on September being up 45% to 96% at 5% 68% From the staff there was an active general demand. The high point on September was reached at 5% C. A slight reaction occurred just before the close, final figures on September being at 5% 68% c. Clearances of wheat and four were equal to 23,300 bushels. Primary receipts were 70% 300 bushels, compared with 571,600 bushels a year ago. Minnespolis, Duluth and Chicago reported receipts of 309 cars, against 211 cars hast week and 23 cars a year ago.

As a result of the decided strength of wheat a firm feeling prevailed in the corn pit. September opened 145% c higher at 50% and alosed at 50%. Local receipts were 178 cars, with 12 of contrast grade.

There was a fair buying of oats by commission houses on the strength of wheat. September opened a shade higher at 35% c ranged between 254,000 and 25% and closed at 35% c. Local receipts were 61 cars. Pending a settlement of the stock yards strike the provisions market was practically lifeless. A small demand from pit traders, with only light offerings, caused a firm undertone. September pork and ribs were each up 3% at the close, final figures being 51255 and 37,507,53%, respectively. Lard was unchanged at 58.50.
