OSCHOLA, Neb., July M .- To the Editor of The Beer In view of the present "atrike" in South Omaha and other points on live stock. I wish to call the attention of all local dealers to a way, in my estimation. conditions local buyers "are at sea," not knowing what prices to offer, or whether stock onn be sold if shipped at any price. At present the chances are that stock will lay in the yards for a week or more at heavy expense to the shipper.

I have before me a circular letter under date of July 15, purported to be sent out by the puckers, and signed by the Cudahy Packing company, Swift and Company, Ar mour & Co., Omaha Packing company stating that they will buy each day 1,200 head of cattle, and from 5,000 to 6,000 hogs, and that the packers have assured the commission man to start buying, as they were abundantly able to handle the above amount of stock. This circular letter was dated July 18, 1804, and in the Drovers Journal-Stockman of July (Tuesday) we find the receipts were 1,900 head of hogs in Omaha, and with but one buyer on the market and he had orders for only a very few loads, the trude was practically at a standstill and markets very unsatisfactory.

We as local dealers have no protection whatever, and the only relief we have is for all "dealers" to hold shipments until the packers and strikers get together and settle their differences. The farmers can easily wait a few weeks, or if necessary, months without offering stock for sale; they have plenty of everything on their the stores for other purposes, to keep them in existence for several months to come.
