

NOTHING FOR STATE DEBT

New Revenue Law Will Not Create a Treasury Surplus.

LEVY LIKELY TO BE LIGHT THIS YEAR

State Board Disinclined to Touch the Limit, Because Even that Would Not Create a Fund Size Enough.

LINCOLN, July 28.—(Special.)—The action of the state legislature to enact a revenue law that would bring in sufficient money to pay off the state debt...

Last year the average levy over the state for all purposes was 7 1/2 mills and this year if the limit is levied for all funds the amount raised cannot be more than it was last year.

Shipping Harvest Needs. At the State Labor bureau preparations are under way for the shipping of wheat to South Dakota. The estimates furnished the bureau from that state call for 15,000 to 20,000 able-bodied men.

Object of Resurvey. State Draftsmen Harvey of the land commissioner's office stated this morning that the survey of western school land boundary lines was intended to prevent any conflict over boundary lines in the future.

Limit of the Levy. In addition to the 5 mill levy for the general fund there can be levied for the school fund 10 to 15 mills; for the university fund 1 mill and for the Home for the People fund 1/2 mill.

Work of State Board. The State Board of Equalization will have completed its work by August 1. It has to do with the valuation of property and the assessment of taxes.

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UNIDENTIFIED MAN IS DEAD

Address of Charles M. Moran in Pocket When Found by Lincoln Police.

LINCOLN, July 28.—(Special Telegram.)—A stranger to the police, supposed to be Charles M. Moran of Pittsfield, Mass., is dead at the city hospital.

The man was picked up on the streets last night suffering from the effects of a fit and died at noon after having been taken to the hospital. In a book in his pocket was the name and address given.

A man registered as A. B. Humphrey of Kansas City, was found dead in the bed at his room at the Lincoln hotel early this morning.

He retired at 8 o'clock yesterday afternoon while feeling ill and is supposed to have died during the night or early this morning. He was a traveling passenger agent for the Lake Shore railroad and by papers on him it was learned that he had a sister living in Ohio.
