DETROIT, Aug 1.—Instead of arbitrarily revising the rates at their recent meeting at Mackinac Island, the senate of the National union, a well-known fraternal society, continued the present natural premium plan of operation, beginning at age twenty with a rate of 50 cents per month and increasing annually to 54 per month at age of sixty-five and which remains level for the remainder of tife, but also adopted an optional plan which gives a level monthly rate for whole life protection from age at entry. Under this plan monthly rate for whole life protection at age of twenty, which remains level for life, is \$1.17 and ranges from that to \$4 per month at age of sixty.
