STATE FAIR CONTINUES TO DRAW WELL

Judging of Butter Shows There is Little to Choose Between Many of the Competitors—Iowaans Take First Prize.

DES MOINES, Aug. 24.—(Special.)—State officials of Iowa are just now up against a proposition which means the setting of a precedent in the matter of regulation of corporations for the protection of the public which may have lasting effect in the state.

The state's investments at the state fair grounds for the past few years have been great. The state and the agricultural department have invested recently some as follows: New exhibition building, not yet finished, \$50,000; livestock pavilion, two years ago, \$47,000; judging pavilion, last year, \$3,000; walks and other improvements, \$20,000.

The stock judging can be done properly and can be witnessed by all visitors in comfort. The erection of the new main building, where the agricultural, dairy and fruit exhibits are shown, made room in three other buildings for the poultry and other things, thus greatly increasing the floor space for the entire exhibition.

SAILORS MAKE GREAT RECORD LAST DAY

Come in from Sixth Place in Skirmish Firing—Regular Infantry Third, Cavalry Fourth and Marine Corps Fifth.

PORT RILEY, Kan., Aug. 24.—(Special Telegram)—New York won the national championship in the national match which has been in progress here since Monday last. 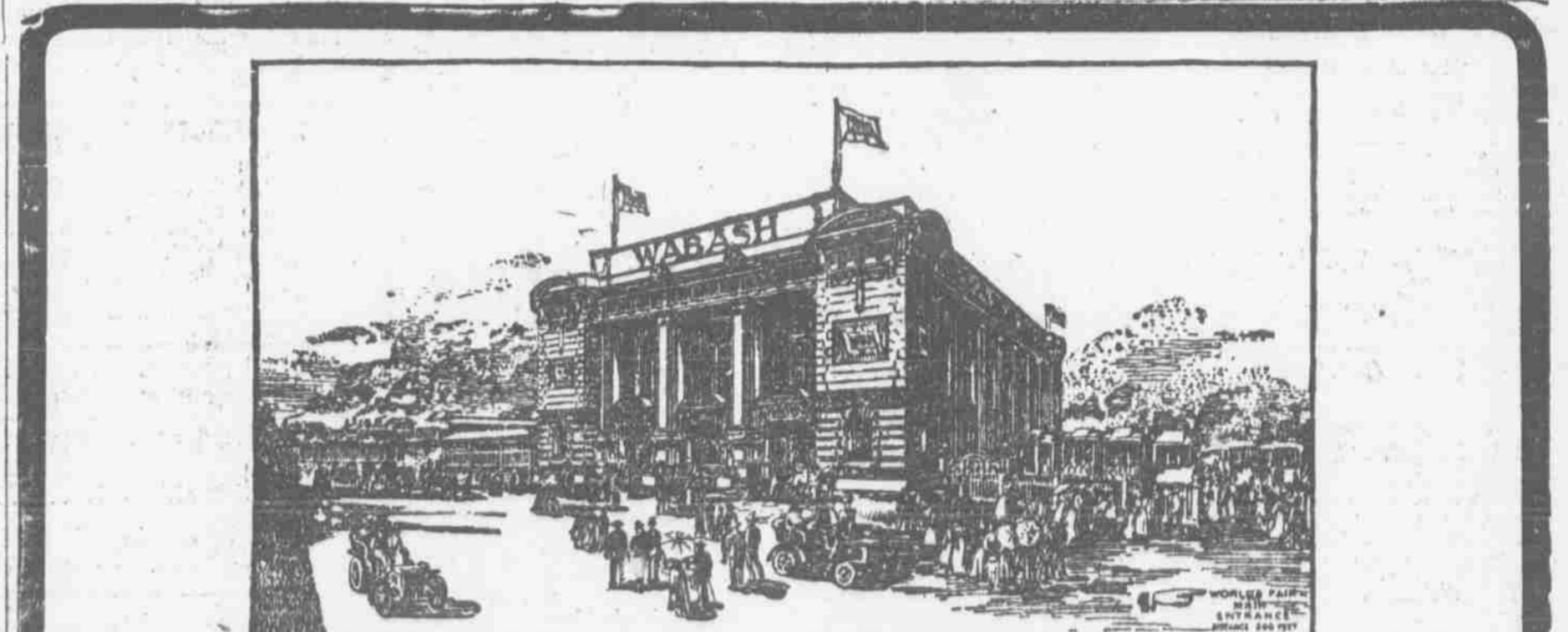
