CONDITION OF OMAHA'S TRADE

More Buyers Were on the Market Last Week Than for Many Months.

ORDERS WERE GENERALLY LIBERAL

> Markets in Good, Healthy Condition and Prospects Considered Favorable for Their Remaining that Way Indefinitely.

House trade with Omaha jobbers and manufacturers was more brisk last week than it has been at any time since last spring. The special railroad rates for the benefit of merchants brought large delegations to the city, and besides that nany stopped off on their way to St. Louis. Their orders were large and numerous in all seasonable and staple lines. As a general thing they had a favorable word to say regarding the outlook for future business, and while they realize that considerable warm weather is needed to make a good corn crop, they feel confident that fall and winter business will be of very satisfactory proportions.

Besides attending to their house trade jobbers had large numbers of orders from their traveling men to fill. Mail orders direct from merchants were also quite numerous, so that taking it altogether the total volume of business was large for this time of year.

total volume of business was large for this time of year.

The markets have fluctuated to some extent during the week, and particularly is that true of groceries. Most lines, though, have not changed to any great extent and the general situation is described by calling values on a good, firm foundation, with indications favorable for their remaining firm in nearly all cases for some time to come.

ome. Collections are not as prompt as they have Collections are not as prompt as they have been at some times, but still no serious complaints are heard. The better movement of live stock is improving the situation to some extent and small grain will also doubtless be marketed quite freely in the near future, which should take considerable cash to the country.

Not Much Change in Sugar.

Wholesaie grocers report the demand for

Wholesaie grocers report the demand for their lines as being as large as could reasonably be expected. The market is also in a good, healthy condition. During the week under review the sugar market has changed very little, so far as refined grades are concerned, but raws are a little firmer. It is reported that refiners are getting well caught up with their orders, but they expect a heavy movement of new business this coming week. The question of freight rates last week caused some of the larger buyers to hold off, but now that difficulty has been settled satisfactorily and jobbers expect a heavy demand from how until the close of the canning and preserving season.

Coffee is still very firm and prices are gradually hardening. Attractive roasting

grades are being eagerly sought for and occoming more and more scarce. Some brands of package coffee have been marked up 'sc and still turther advances are looked up we and still turther advances are looked for.

The cheese market has also strengthened, the advance for the week amounting to Milke, and the general impression prevalls that higher prices will rule in the near future. The quality of the goods coming forward is reported unusually good for this time of the year.

In the line of canned goods local jobbers were rather surprised last week by the Alaska Packers association, in that opening prices on red Alaska salimon are about the period of the season a year ago. So far as the results of the season a work are concerned, it is said that higher prices than these would have been accepted by the jobbers, the general impression being that they would be about the same as last year. These low prices make it certain that there will be a big trade on red Alaskas this season.

The market on California canned goods is still strong and many packers have withdrawn from the market entirely on peaches, pears and apricots, except on some of the fancy grades. Gallon pie peaches have been marked up for per dozen and very few are obtainable even at those prices. Baltimore packers have advanced their ideas on peaches, as recent crop developments have been very unsatisfactory.

Canned tomatoes for future delivery have advanced in Baltimore and slight advances have taken place in Indiana. This hardening of values is due to unsatisfactory crop conditions in both these localities. Many corn packers, for the same reason, have withdrawn all offerings, fearing an early frost, which would make it impossible for them to make a fair pack.

In the line of dried fruits, peaches, and particularly the lower grades, have advanced, while apricots are very strong and indications are that higher prices will rule at no distant date. Prunes are easier, both spots and futures. The California raisin seeders have apparently got together on a working agreement of some kind and have advanced the market on new seeded tyc per pound. Evaporated raspberries are slightly lower, while Now York apples for fall del The cheese market has also strengthened

Other staple lines of groceries not mentioned above are selling in much the same notches they were a week ago.

Much improvement in Dry Goods.

Visiting dry goods merchants arrived last week in large numbers and in fact there were more in the city than at any time is large the rush of house trade came to a close last spring. As a general thing they were very liberal buyers and consequently the amount of business transacted was unusually large. There was no mistaking the fact that they were in a better frame of mind than the merchants who were in a short time ago, owing no doubt, to the favorable corn weather experienced the greater part of the time for the last two weeks. They seem to feel now that a fair corn crop is practically certain while a record breaking crop is not at all improbable. Much Improvement in Dry Goods.

The market for cotton goods is in much The market for cotton goods is in much the same position it was a week ago, the only change being a reduction of 2 cents on leading brands of fancy prints. Attention is called by local jobbers to the fact that many lines of cotton goods are selling cheaper than they were three years ago, long before the scarcity of cotton developed. That being the case they do not see how prices can go any lower, but on the contrary, they consider such lines at present prices good property. Wire Nails Unsettled.

Wire Nails Unsettled.

So far as the market on wire and nails is concerned there has not been much change since the weakness which was reported a week ago. Jobbers are rather inclined to think that the reductions made at that time will be of a temporary character, as they were brought about, not by a reduction in the cost of production, but through competition. The disturbing element at this time is the rather demoralized condition of freight rates on this line of goods. It is impossible at this time to state what action will finally be taken by the railroads and until an adjustment is made which will be satisfactory to all concerned the market will be rather unsettled.

Other lines of hardware are selling in just about the same notches they were a week ago and no important changes are being predicted for some time to come. It is what jobbers call a good, healthy market.

Trade conditions are also very satisfactory. The movement of fall goods is brisk and covers the entire line. Trade so far on all goods has been equal to last year's good record and consequently jobbers are not doing any complaining. They look for a continued brisk demand throughout the fall and winter season.

In the line of farm implements a good demand for wagons is reported although there is some tendency to hold back until something more definite about the final outcome of the corn crop is known. With a good crop a heavy movement is anticled. outcome of the corn crop is known. With a good crop a heavy movement is anticipated. Shovel boards are also selling to good advantage. For this season of the year there is a good burgy trade, the same as has been the case all the year.

The demand for plows is also good, as considerable fall plowing is being done and more will be done before the end of the season. Implement men state that so far as their fall trade is concerned they have very little cause or complaint.

The demand for leather goods showed some improvement last week, the same as was the case in almost every line. Quite a good many merchants were in the city and hought freely. Some of them state that they have considerable stock on hand carried over from last winter and also quite a lot of summer lines on hand, while others are well cleaned out on all kinds. In other words, the trade has been a little spotted, but at the same time the outlook for the future is considered very favorable for both wholesalers and retailers.

The different lines of shoes being fanufatoured in Omaha are growing rapidly in popularity. Merchants are taking hold of them freely and find they meet with favor in the eyes of their customers. Omaha is getting to be quite a shoe manufacturing town and present indications are that its reputation in that direction will continue to improve at a rapid rate.

There have been no changes in the leather market to speak of. The same as previously mentioned the comparative scarcity of hides due to the packing house strike has put the leather market on a good, firm basis.

Fruits and Vegetables.

The demand for fruit last week was again very heavy for even this time of the year. There never has been a better trade on fruit in fact, than has been experienced so far this season. The abundance of all kinds of fruit, together with the reasonable prices charged, are no doubt responsible in a large measure. The talk of high priced ment has also had a tendency to cause people during hot weather to eat more fruit and vegetables and less meat.

Grapes are now on the market and home grown stock is being quoted at about \$0 to \$5 cents per basket of eight or ten pounds. A large crop is assured and the quality is said to be unusually fine.
