NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—There is little to be said for today's stock market. Trading during the greater part of the brief session was dult and norrow and the tone was rather irregular. London sent lower prices and renewed activity in the commodity markets and this probably accounted for the attitude of the trading element. A private estimate that the wheat crop is likely to fall \$20,00,000 bushels below that of 1901 and very much below that of isst year commanded serious attention in many quarters.
