Wheat and other grain markets are in a rather narvous congition. The manner in which speculative shorts will run on the slightest provocation is an indication of the tenderness of their position—and of the fact that they are not at all sure of it. The prices on all grain are admittedly high, especially on wheat, and it aimost requires continuous buil news to maintain prices. Even when the threshing returns and the goasip reports are of a character to sustain the stories of damage to the northwestern crops the buils find it hard to keep up prices against a speculative bear movement, and it is only when the latter undertake to cover that the latest strength shows. The weather map is a factor of considerable importance this morning, rain in the sections where harvesting legoing on, colder weather, poor harvesting returns and speculative operations were the dominant factors. Shoutly after the opening the markets were all firmer and about 4c higher, but this was quickly followed by a reaction of 4,03c to the low point of the session. Local receipts have fallen off materially and the lower prices of grain as compared with a week ago have checked stipments to this market. A high quality of any kind of grain would induce buyers to pay good prices, but Nebraska elevator men seem to be sending only their poor stuff here or else they haven't got any better on hand.

CHICAGO, Aug 31.—The influence of poor threshing returns and unfavorable weather in the northwest finally gained the ascendancy over liberal primary receipts today, and as a result the wheat market closed firm, with December up 1624c. Corn also was up 1644c. Oats showed a gain of 16. Provisions were weak, closing with a loss of 14 to 30c.

Heavy rains in Manitoba and the Dakonas imparted some firmness to wheat at the opening. December being 16c lower to 16c higher, at 11.074 to 15.084. On the slight advance there was liberal selling by some of the recent bulls, who were beginning to fear there might soon be receipts of new spring wheat in sufficient quantities to cause temporary depression, at least, in the market. Commission houses were fair buyers, but the demand was not sufficient to absorb all the offerings. As a result a weak tone developed, December declining to 11.074. Later the weather bureau, predicting continued rain in both the wheat and corn regions, revived the enthusiasm of the bull leaders. At the same time reports of poor threshing returns had some influence on trading. NEW HIGH RECORD FOR READING SHARES

Stocks of Grain-Carrying Roads Weaker Because of Adverse Conditions Affecting Crops.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The stock market tousy bore the usual ante-holinay aspects. Frice movements were rather irregular and oussiess was in lighter volume. Those traders who were not really oealish seemed inclined to reduce their commitments for a variety of reasons. These inclined the heaviness of internationals in London, where operations usingled to nominal proportions. The reactionary tendency of alissouri Facinc, Missouri, Kansas & Texas, Atchison and Colorado Southern properties, whose earnings are likely to be adversely affected by any serious damage to the corn crop, also helped to check the upward course of the list. The wheat situation was again watched with ususual interest and the usettled condition of the cotton market was viewed with disfavor. Nevertheless stocks were not offered with any freedom and there was an absence of the previous day's liquidation. Following the initial decline there was early buying of Reading, Erie and St. Paul at improved prices, the first named advancing on a relatively heavy volume of trade to a new high record.

The Metropolitan issues recovered in a large measure from yesterday's weakness. United States Steel shares and Amaigamated Copper led the usual group. Aside from the increasing strength Reading and several other active conlers' indecision market the course of the market all through the early session. Erie common continued one of the few prominent features, several large blocks changing hands at further fractional advances, while Reading lost all its early advance on realizing sales.
