FOUR TRACK EAST TO WEST

Vanderbilt System Doubles Facilities from New York to Chicago

PLANS ARE BEING HURRIED ALONG Borthwestern Then Will Have Clear Sway from Omaha to the Empire City of the

Country.

Plans have been carried out which will increase the trackage system of the Vanderbiit reads from Omaha into New York city. Five million dollars are to be expended on the venture. The Northwestern already is a double track road from Omaha to Chicago and the New York Central is four track from New York to Buffalo. The connecting link is the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern and work already is under way for two more tracks between Chicago and Buffalo, thus completing the

chain. A large quantity of steel rails is being distributed along the Lake Shore between Buffalo and Cleveland and several tons more of the rails will be needed before the tracks are completed. With the improvements now under way, it also will become necessary to enlarge the railroad yards of the Vanderbilt system, and it is understood Omaha is to receive a share of attention. Five million dollars already have been expended on the Lake Shore in the last two years in the way of improvements between Chicago and Buffalo to wipe out curves and grades, and much attention is now being given to the enlargement of the facilities for the handling of grain. About \$1,500,000 worth of new equipment also has been bought, and a redistribution of heavy motive power is being made on the different divisions. Some of the bridges have been found too light to sustain the heavy trains that are passing over them, and this has furnished another item of expense.

One Difficulty to Be Met. While the increasing business of the system has made necessary the improvements now under way, the short subsidiary lines or feeders have, in recent years, increased in number more rapidly than have the transportation facilities of the main line. This is one of the difficulties that is nos being remedied. An Omaha representative of one of the Vanderbilt lines said:

"There is another feature of railroading which has made the improvement necessary and one which the general public would overlook. This is the constantly increasing shortage of car service. Tracks are congested and cars are apparently continually diminishing in number, in spite of the fact that every year an enormous sum is put into new freight cars. For a long time is was a source of marvel as to what became of the cars. They disappeared about as fast as the shortage was replenished.

"Investigation has shown the cars are tied up as the result of congested lines. Cars cannot be moved forward to their destination and the result is they are used as warehouses. Every year this trouble is getting worse and the hope is indulged that by increasing the carrying facilities of the system this trouble will be overcome, in a large measure at least, for we cannot expect to wipe it out entirely.

The improvement in the passenger department alone will be tremendous, for it gives the Vanderbilt system a double track from Omaha to the Atlantic seaboard."

Obstacle to Gasoline Motor. While the Union Pacific has temporarily discontinued the experiments with its gasoline motor engine, the idea has not been entirely abandoned.

It was with cheap motive power as the end in view that the Union Pacific began a series of experiments and constructed a model, but the company is not yet satisfied with the machine. In general appearance the motor resembles a combination of automobile and locomotive. The machine has been stored away for the present, but it is the intention to resume the experiments. It is understood that Mr. McKeen, superintendent of motive power and machinery, has several new ideas which he expects to carry out in the construction of the machine, and which it is believed will bring about satisfactory results in the operation of such a motor. He declines, however, to discuss the subject. Railroad men are confident a successful gasoline motor can be built. One of the Union Pacific machinists

"Nothing has been done with the motor of late. Naturally there is considerable apeculation as to whether it will be a success, but I don't see why it can't be made to work. The superintendent has hopes of doing something with it, and some of the experts down at the shops think it can be made to work. Such a motor may work for light passenger hauls, but in my opinion it never will be a success for anything

"Even our heaviest locomotives are racked all to pieces by the big hauls they have and they have to undergo frequent repairs. I have every confidence in the successful operation of a gasoline motor for light passenger hauls, but the great is that neither gasoline nor electricity is reliable enough to be used in a country of long hauls like the west. For this reason it is doubtful that they will supersede steam for years to come. You


