ALL WHEAT FUTURES LOSE ABOUT A POINT

Corn Off About 1 1-2c on Probable Escare from Front-Onta Easler -Gossip of Grain and Stock Pits.

CMAHA, September 16, 1904.

Liverpool started off the wheat markets of the world with a decline of \(\frac{1}{2} \)d. This was naturally a bear influence, but not too much so as it would have been a year ago. America is not taking pointers on the wheat situation or prospects from England or any other foreign country. It has use for all its wheat if it doesn't export a pound. There was an influence, however, that was potent for easier markets and that was a return of the good old summer time, warmer weather actually displacing the chilip atmosphere of the last few days and predictions as to the immediace future being reassuring in the same general direction. This was taken as an indication of better harvest conditions in the wheat states and as auguring especially well for the nearly matured cornerop. The news was of such a character as to lower prices and to cause the longs to take profits more or less freely. The result was an immediate break after the opening in wheat of about \(\frac{1}{2} \)c and after a little temporary rally there was another sharp slump, this time extending to 1½ point. The September delivery, while rather more firm than the deferred futures at the opening, went off fully as much as they did later on. The reaction when placed side by side with the gains of the last few days was inconsiderable. Corn gave way very slowly in the opening, but as the weather map showed blue sky and more sunshine the bears took courage and the promine of the cereal getting out of the way of Jack Frost increased to such an extent that there was a slump of 1½ a bushel. September of 52c, December from 52½c to 50%c and May from 51½c to 475c.

During the last half of the session there was a general weakening of wheat prices and the final closing showed losses of 2 points all around.

The market for western grass beef steers was quite active and steady with yesterday. There were some good cattle on sale from Wyoming that brought \$4.40. That was the top price for some little time past, and the cattle weighed 123 pounds. As compared with a week ago, the general market on grass beef steers is a little higher, the demand at this point apparently being in excess of the supply.

The better grades of cows were somewhat neglected this morning, and sold at rather uneven prices. In some cases they sold about steady, and in others they were a little lower.
