CRIMINAL RECOGNIZED

ARRESTED THIS TIME FOR STEALING

Detectives and Police Raid Midway Resort and Find Gang of Ex-Strike Breakers, All of Whom Are Taken In.

When John Murphy was arrested Sunday by Detective Savage, Captain of Police Haze recognized in Murphy the man he arrested eighteen years ago for robbing St. Philomena's cathedral during choir practice. Murphy gave the name of John Kelly at the time of the robbery and received a entence of four years, returning to Omaha at the expiration of the sentence. He is then said by police officials to have robbed 27, at 8 p. m., in Young's hall, Sixteenth a saloon in Omaha, for which offense he received another sentence, not having been seen here from that time until arrested Bunday.

Murphy was arrested this last time of the charge of stealing a coat and umbrella from Fred Langewisch of 1117 Farnam street. The articles were found in a pawnshop. Murphy was sentenced to ninety days by Acting Police Judge Bachman.

Raid on Strike Breakers. Sunday morning about 4:30 o'clock Detective Ferris and Officers Baldwin, Knox and Shields made an early morning call at the Midway, the notorious colgred resort at 1124 Capitol avenue, and arrested a crowd of colored men found sleeping at the place. They were charged with vagrancy, being mable to give the police officials a satisfactory account of themselves. They were ex-strike breakers and had quit their jobs at South Omaha. Most of them gave their ddresses in the southland. There were fourteen in the bunch and when searched at the police station is cents was found on the men. When arraigned in police court Acting Judge Bachman gave each fourteen days in the county jail.

This makes over fifty colored prisoners in the county jail, which is now more congested than it has been for a long time. the officials report. Andy McVaney and Dave Peters. Albert Mosby of St. Louis and Louis Jenkins of Kentucky, colored, who were arrested by Detectives Ferris and Dunn on the charge of robbing K. C. Clark at Twenty-fourth and Miami streets last Saturday night, have been arraigned in police court complaints filed by Assistant County Attorney Magney. The prisoners waived proliminary examination and were bound over to the district court on bonds of \$700

When arrested Saturday night the men old Captain Mostyn they bought the recolver with which they intimidated Clark for the purpose of robbing a grocery store, but, their earlier plans having failed, they stopped the first man they saw, who hap-pened to be Clark. The robbery was the regulation affair, one of the men holding Clark by the throat and the other keeping he victim cool with a large revolver. A watch was all the men secured.
