Crocker of New York and San Francisco has instructed his attorneys to institute suit for the recovery of \$20,000 alleged to have been paid a well known Parls surgeon and discoverer of a serum for the treatment of cancer. The treatment was given to Mrs. Emma Rutherford Crocker last spring in France, but she died a few months later at Newport, R. I., having been brought to America after hope of saving her life was abandoned.

Mr. Crocker asserts that the injections of serum only weakened the patient and finally were discontinued. He had been compelled to pay the full fee in advance, and has instructed his attorneys to turn over any sum they may recover to the Pasteur institute of Paris for its use.




