

# JUNCIL BLUFFS. OUR TROUBLE ON LIBRARY

pesters' Union has the Contractors Declared an Unfair Firm.

ASSERT THEY DO NOT PAY UNION SCALE

Contractors Deny the Charge and Say Men Are Paid Overtime for All Over Eight Hours—Also Deny Importing Labor.

Notice was served yesterday morning on the board of trustees of the free public library and Winchester a Council, the firm erecting the new Carnegie library building that the Council Bluffs Trades and Labor Assembly, on demand of the local Carpenters' union, had adopted resolutions placing the library and the contractors on the "unfair list." The assembly also sent notice of its action to the Carpenter's union at Jameson, Ia., Wis., the home of the contractors who are putting up the building.

The Carpenters' union complains that union men are being employed on the library; that they are working ten hours a day, instead of eight, and that they are paid \$12.50 a day for ten hour work instead of \$8.50 an hour, the local union says.

Mr. Cullen, when seen yesterday, stated that the firm was operating under an agreement with the Carpenters' union of Jameson, although the only men brought from that town were two brick masons and that the local unions had absolutely no cause for complaint. He said: "The fact of the matter is that the local Carpenters' union is laboring under a misapprehension of the facts. I have not imported any carpenters from Jameson, and the only men from there are two brick masons. I am doing just as all other contractors in this city do. All the carpenters employed by us are Council Bluffs men, and while some days when the weather is favorable they have worked ten hours they have done so of their own free will and have received pay for extra time. We are doing everything we can to get the building under cover before the cold weather sets in and that is the reason why some of the men have worked overtime. The local unions have no complaint concerning us I told before, because I did not even bring my foreman from Jameson, but employed a Council Bluffs man. I found some difficulty in securing sufficient numbers of brickmasons to do the amount of building going on in this city, and I am compelled to bring in men from Jameson to town. This would not have been done had we been able to secure a sufficient number of men here."

Members of the library board when seen yesterday said they had not had time to give the matter much attention, but from what they had learned they were of the opinion that the Carpenters' union had no cause for complaint. They were not at all apprehensive that the action of the Trades and Labor assembly would delay work on the building or involve other trades in the matter.

## HIGH SCHOOL FOOT BALL.

Smith, F. Smith, Stubbs, Baird, Green and Hawkins.
