Possibility of Foreign Troubles and Milling Demand Advances Wheat.

FREE CASH SALES FOR NO. 3 WHEAT

Fotures in Chicago Are a Point ligher-Statistical Position-News on Grain and Financial Gosstp.

As expected, the possibilities of trouble between Russia and Engiand over the North sea incident was sufficient incentive in a decidedly strong opening to the wheat market. This was secompanied by a disposition on the part of the bear element to stand aside and let the market severely alone until such time as the incident is diplomatically sattled. Should it by any chance lead to trouble between the two mations wheat would start on a soaring expedition that would make all past prices look cheap. The quality of the wheat received in Omaha was decidedly better than for some time past and there was not the slightest trouble in disposing of it at high prices. No. 3 of a good quality, averaging about fifty-seven pounds test, sold up to \$1.07, and No. 4 sold to \$1.05. These are high prices for this market, but they simply indicate the urgency of the demand for the milling grades. The receipts in the north-west continue quite large, but they are failing off in the southwest. The northwest is holding decidedly strong Minneapolis advancing prices sharply today, while Kansas City and St. Louis yielded slowly to the advancing tendency. Some of the experts figure that at least 50 per cent of the northwestern crep has been marketed, and if they are right prices should move sharply in the direction of higher figures. In any event it is practically certain that there will be no serious break in prices, and this fact has been recognized by millers who are busily competing for grain in all sections of the country. Chicago reported Valentine (Armour) as a very large buyer at different times, taking as high as 500,000 bushels need to be previous week and 11,385,000 bushels a year ago. Wheat on passage decreased 1,400,000 bushels.

Foreign advices on both wheat and corn were influenced by the North sea incident, all prices being materially firmer. It is not likely that serious results will follow, but the statistical position is against lower prices.
