carried Indiana by 75,000 or more, and that the state ticket will run about 35,000 behind this plurality. MASSACHUSETTS. BOSTON, Nov. 9.—The defeat of Governor Bates for a third term by Douglas, the democratic candidate, and the tremendous vote cast throughout the state were the noteworthy features of yesterday's election in Massachusetts. Mr. Douglas will be the first democratic governor elected since 1852.

With one ward and one small town missing, the vote for president was as follows: Roosevelt, 257,488; Parker, 108,411. Roosevelt plurality, 149,077. The vote for governor, with the same places missing, was as follows: Douglas, 238,405; Bates, 198,738. A Douglas plurality, 39,667. Notwithstanding the defeat of the party candidate for governor, the republicans gained one congressman, two senators and several members of the house, and probably elected the remainder of the state ticket, including Lieutenant Governor Curtis Guild, jr.

The new congressional delegation will stand eleven republicans and three democrats. The legislature, which will select two United States senators, will stand in the upper branch, thirty-four republicans and six democrats, and in the lower 108 republicans, seventy-one democrats and one independent.

For the first time in several years there will be no socialist in the legislature. MARYLAND. BALTIMORE, Nov. 9.—Returns received from all the counties in Maryland—except two show a plurality for Roosevelt of 1,118. The two counties not heard from are Charles and St. Mary's, with large negro populations, which returns will almost certainly increase the foregoing figures.

It is admitted that thousands of democrats belonging to what was called the "silent vote," cast their ballots for Roosevelt. Democratic State Chairman VanDiver, who had predicted a sweeping victory and a large majority for Parker and Davis, and today that he is utterly as a loss to explain the republican landslide, except on the theory of the president's personal popularity.

Dispatches from the counties state that in some instances, as at Cumberland, democrats openly cut their ticket and joined the republicans in celebrating the election of Roosevelt. NEVADA. RENO, Nev., Nov. 9.—Incomplete returns indicate a complete republican victory, with congressmen only in doubt. Roosevelt's estimated plurality will exceed 2,000.

George B. Nixon (rep.) is undoubtedly elected United States senator, against Governor Sparks, to succeed Senator Stewart. The congressional fight is close, with the possibility that Van Duzer (dem.) is elected by a very close margin, but the republican state central committee still claims Fortney (rep.) by a small majority. Frank H. Norcross (rep.) is elected judge of the supreme court by a large majority.

In Washoe county, polling one-fourth of the vote of the state, the republican victory is complete. FLORIDA. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 9.—Indications are that the democratic plurality for the state will be about 20,000.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 9.—Roosevelt's plurality in this state will be over 4,000, while Lea, the republican compromise candidate for governor, will have a plurality of nearly 10,000. The republican gain in the legislature will be a majority on the joint ballot of 116. This will mean the election of J. Edward Addicks as United States senator. Corrected returns show the standing of the legislature on joint ballot to be republican by twelve.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—Latest figures given by the republican party probably 60,000 more counties going republican for the first time. The republicans gain two congressmen, defeating Miers and Hobbs in the Second and Twelfth districts. Additional returns indicate that Roosevelt
