SIZER GIVES OUT SOME INFORMATION

Note in Laneaster Surprises the San guine Fusionists and Daylight Rudely Dispels Dream They Were Nursing.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 8 - (Special.) - Edward R. Sizer, who has conducted Congressman Burkett's campaign, announced this afternoon that the republicans had swept the legislature and would have beyond any doubt 115 on joint ballot. The senate, Mr. Sizer says, will be unanimous, though he has not yet heard officially from Gould in the Ninth district. The house will have beyond doubt cighty-two republicans, he said. Grimstead is defeated in Richardson county, and it will take the official vote to decide whether Smith is elected in the same county. In the Fifteenth district Petrownky is defeated. No official returns have been received by Mr. Sizer from the Nineteenth district. In the Twenty-fourth district the election of Henglar is in doubt. He lives in Pintte county. In Butler county the two republican candidates were defeated. In the Thirty-third district Ryd, the float delegate of Gage and Saline, is defeated by 100. Mr. Sizer has not received official returns from the Thirty-ninth, Forty-eighth, Fifty-sixth, Fifty-seventh, Sixty-third, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh, nor from Holt and Red Willow counties. Mr. Sizer holds that all the delegates to the legislature have received their instructions to vote for Elmer J. Burkett for United States senator by the action of the republican state convention.

Lancaster Vote.

The returns from Lancaster county are still coming in and the tabulation is progressing very slowly. Up to night the county committee had not counted up the vote on the county, legislative or congressional tickets, and neither had the vote of Burkett for United States senator been counted. So far as tabulated the returns give Mickey 6,568 and Berge 5,607. Forty-Your precincts out of fifty-two give Rooseveit 7,826, Parker 1,626, Watson 596, Swallow 528, Daba 126. Mickey's majority in Lantaster is just one less than it was two years

While the official returns have not yet been figured up on the vote for congressman in this district it is known that Congressman Burkett will receive as large if not larger vote than he did two years ago. Mr. Burkett received many telegrams of congratulation from various parts of the country and state this morning. Among the number were messages from John L. Kennedy of Omaha, A. B. At that time Stephenson believed that Berge would be elected. This, together with the outrageous claims made by the democratic state committee, the claim of Mr. Bryan and Mr. Berge that Berge would be elected by a large majority, reated gloom in the ranks of the republi cans. Up to this time no returns had been received from the North Platte country and the friends of Governor Mickey be lieved that in this county the governo would be slashed. Near morning the returns took a turn and republican en thuslasm ran riot.
