Miss Overton Makes Statement About Her New Book, "Captains of the World."

WINTER FASHIONS SET FORTH IN DESIGNER

The Delineator Has a Message of Good Cheer and Helpfulness that Will Be Welcomed in Every Home-White's Great Success.

The statement has been made in several quarters that the scene of Miss Gwendolen Overton's new story, "Captains of the World," is laid in Pittsburg, and that the strike described in it is the Homestead strike of '92. Miss Overton states positively, through her publishers, the Macmillan company, that she has not described any one place-that the scene of her story is a conglomerate of many places and of pure imagination. Also, any one who knows the great Homestead strike at all will know that nothing in the strike in "Captains of the World" is quite like it. The basis and cause of the strike itself are totally different. In this case, too, there are bits of numerous strikes and the rest is pure invention. Miss Overton has not copied any event in our industrial history.

Winter fashlons as set forth in the Designer for December are stylish and essentially practical, and are augmented by three pages of charming party costumes which will prove acceptable at this season when dainty raiment is in active demand. 'Points on Dressmaking." a valuable department of the magazine, gives explicit directions for making fur collarettes and muffs of new design, and its sister department, "Ler, ins in Millinery," tells how to make an exquisite evening hat. The Designer caters to the woman who sews, and in addition to the above features contains this month novel Christmas gifts in which dainty needlework is a necessary factor. In the literary portion of the magazine is a boliday play for amateur production entitled "The Snow Man," "A St. Nicholas Party," an exquisite poem, "At Bethel-hem," and two short stories, "A Christmas Romance" and "How Dorothy Found Santa "Making Up for Private Theatricals" is an article which will be highly appreclated by smateur actors, who seldom pay sufficient attention to this very im portant part of the stage business, while "The Lady and the Lunch." the first instalment of the valuable series, "In the Interest of Beauty," discourses on a subject ted often treated with careleseness. "A Christmas Alphabet Supper" is an original idea for entertainment, and droll and pretty schemes for the presentation of gifts and decoration of the Yuie tree are supplied in generous quantity. In fact, the December Designer is just what a magazine should he at this season-brimful of goodwill to all men, with a strong leaning toward the woman contingent.

The December Delineator, with its message of good cheer and helpfulness, will be welcomed in every home. The fashion pages are unusually attractive, illustrating and describing the very latest modes in a way to make their construction during the busy festive season a pleasure instead of a task, and the literary and pictorial features are of rare excellence. A selection of love songs from the Wagner operas, rendered into English by Richard de Gallienne and beautifully illustrated in colors by J. C. Leyendecker, occupies a prominent place, and a chapter in the composers' series, relating the romance of Wagner and Cosima, is an interesting supplement to the lyrics. A very clever paper, entitled "The Court Circles of the Republic," describes some unique phases of Washington social life, is from an unnamed contributor, who is said to write from the inner circles of society. There are short stories from the pens of F. Hopkinson Smith, Robert Grant, Alice Brown, Mary Stewart Cutting and Elmore Elliott Peake, and such interesting writers as Julia Magruder, L. Frank Baum and Grace MacGowan Cooke hold the attention of the children. Many Christmas suggestions are given in needlework and the cookery pages are redolent of the Christmas feast. In addition, there are the regular departments of the magazine, with many special articles on topics relating to woman's interests within and without the

John Burroughs is always at home when he is out, as the Irishman has it. "Far and Near" is the title of the new volume of out-door essays which Houghton, Miffin & Co. have just published. The appropriateness of the title is shown by a glance at the table of contents, which begins with "in Green Alaska," followed immediately by "Wild Life Around My Cabin." It will be remembered that Mr. Burroughs was a member of the Harriman expedition of 1899 which visited the tree less coasts and islands of Alaska and Siberia. Fully one-half of the book concerns these northern tracts, while a num-ber of the chapters tell of the island of Jamaica during the fair season.
