Chinsaman is Hanged. Recently a silk-clad Chinsaman, who was seen traveling in a sampan, was watched by the Russians, who observed that, following the discharge of each shell, he placed a handkerchief to his nose and then into his left pocket, occasionally varying these movements, apparently thus signifying the landing places of the shells.

One day last week a hospital ship moved to near the battleships in the harbor, whereupon the Japanese dropped small shells around it with the obvious purpose of warning it away.

It is reported that the Japanese are concentrating strong forces on their left and center, undoubtedly with the realization that they must be assured of speedy success before attacking, as it will be impossible for their armies to remain in the field without shelter, owing to the bitterly cold nights.

Soldiers Fight with Pistols. CHANSHIANOUTUN, Manchuria, General Kuropatkin's Headquarters, Nov. 17.—The Japanese, according to the Russian scouts, are heavily fortifying their second line of defense along the Taikie river.

CHE FOO, Nov. 17.—The three Japanese torpedo boat destroyers which entered the harbor this morning, to ascertain if the Russian torpedo boat destroyer Rastoropy was here, disappeared for a time, but reappeared this afternoon.

FATHER SCHELL ARRESTED

Priest Who Fights Reservation Grifters Caught in Trap. Explains Case as Work of Revenge.

John Allen, Merchant, Who Knows of Situation, Defends Father Schell as Victim of Outrageous Persecution.

Father Schell, the Catholic priest who has made himself a terror to the grifters and bootleggers at the Winnebago Indian reservation, was arrested in Omaha yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Kelso from Thurston county.

In explanation of the matter Father Schell said: 'Mrs. Little Walker came to me a few days ago and made considerable complaint regarding Ashford's bank and also in O'Connor's bank at Homer. I advised her to transfer her funds to the Bank of Sloan, where she would receive interest on her deposit. I went with her and her husband and an interpreter to Homer, O'Connor and made a money certificate of deposit non-transferable for one year.

The corridors of the federal building are fairly well crowded with Winnebago and other Indians, summoned here to testify in the various bootleg cases. Numerous cases of drunkenness are noticed among the Indians, indicating that they have but little trouble in procuring liquor in Omaha.

The personnel of the Indian witnesses is noticeably different from those testifying before the grand jury heretofore. The petit jury was again excused yesterday, and over to Father Schell by no case yet ready for trial before a jury.

John Allen, a trader three miles south of the Winnebago agency, who was in Omaha when Father Schell was arrested, stated that he knew of this particular case and passed some interesting comments on the general proceedings carried on by the grifters.

AGAINST VACATING STREET. Opposition Develops to Ordinance Proposing Condensation of Thirtieth from Walnut Down.

Opposition is developing to the ordinance proposing to close and vacate Thirtieth street from Walnut to Pacific right-of-way at the Mary District of the Omaha grain terminals. It has been discovered that this bit of street was bought long ago by the city for the express purpose of connecting the new Bancroft street subway with Twenty-ninth street.

FOUR MEN ARE ASPHYXIATED. Entire Working Force in Gas Plant Found Dead, with Machinery Running Full Blast.

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—Four men were asphyxiated by gas at Dover, N. J., today at the plant of the Dover, Rockaway and Port Oriskany Gas company. They constituted the entire working force of the plant and were discovered by George E. Bunnell, a former employee, who on visiting the plant found it apparently deserted with engines running under full load of steam and scarcely any water in the boilers.
