SUICIDE CAUSED BY FRIGHT to Fort Madison today by Sheriff Canning.

Boy Takes His Life Through Fear of Being Arrested with Other Boys.

Heart Failure at First Supposed to Be Cause, but Post Mortem Shows Death Was Due to Carbolle Acid Poisoning.

Leroy Messner, the 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Messner, 1614 Seventh avenue died shortly after midnight Thurs. day night. That his death was due to carbolic acid taken by the boy with suicidal intent and not to heart failure, as claimed by the parents, was the opinion of the at tending physicians, and their diagnosis was confirmed yesterday by a post-mortem examination.

In view of the peculiar circumstances surrounding the case and the result of the post-mortem examination held yesterday afternoon by Drs. N. J. Rice and M. J. Belinger, two of the physicians who attended the boy, Coroner Treynor decided to hold an inquest. The inquest will be held this morning at 10 o'clock in Cutler's undertak-

Unconscious to the End.

The boy returned to his home Thursday evening about 6 o'clock, when his mother oticed him at a hydrant in the yard. He hortly after commenced to practice on the plane, but his mother, noticing his hands were soiled, told him to go and wash them. It was while doing this in the kitchen that he suddenly reeled and fell to the floor. At first his parents thought that some of his companions might have given him intoxisating drink, but as he rapidly became unconscious they grew alarmed and summoned a physician. All efforts to revive the boy proved futile and he remained unconscious until his death.

The boy's breath smelled of carbolic acid, as did his handkerchief, but there were no traces of corrosion on the tongue and throat. This was explained from the fact that the acid which the boy is thought to have taken was diluted, it having been used by a member of the family to ally toothache. The bottle which contained the carbolic acid and which was on a shelf in the pantry, was said to be missing.

LOTS DONATED TO NEW FACTORY City Deeds Land Taken in on Foreclosure for Taxes.

The city council at a special meeting ast night agreed to donate nine lots owned the city on West Broadway to Mesers. J. F. Hughes and G. G. Woodin as a site for their factory in consideration of their removing their wagon box and shovel board manufacturing plant from Oskaloosa o this city. Mesers Hughes and Woodin had concluded negotiations with the Commercial club and all that was needed to assure the location of the factory here was the donation by the city of these lots for a site.

In consideration for receiving these lots Messrs, Hughes and Woodin agree to organize a corporation with \$25,000 capital stock, of which \$15,000 shall be fully paid up at the start, and within ten days after the execution of the deeds they will commence the construction of four frame buildings, such as they now have in Oskaloosa, each 40x100 feet, and will continue to operate the plant for three years continuously, "subject only to necessary closing required by good business management and consistent with good faith in operation."

In the event of failure to operate the factory as agreed Messrs. Hughes and Woodin bind themselves to pay the city \$2,000 or within 120 days to deliver back possession of the lots and remove all build-

ings from same. The property which the city agrees to deed to the company to be organized by Measrs. Hughes and Woodin and which will be known as the Council Bluffs Manufacturing company, comprises lots 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10, block 38, Central subdivision. The lots are on the south side of Broadway between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets and convenient to trackage. In order to acquire lots 7 and 9 the city had to exchange lots 11 and 12 for them with Gilbert Bros, and Mrs. E. L. Gretzer, which arrangement has been agreed upon. The lots are valued at about \$100 each and were acquired by the city on foreclosure for non-payment of special

improvement taxes several years ago. The company, it was stated, will start operations with twenty-five men, but expects to increase this force materially before long. The plant will manufacture wagon boxes, shovel boards and other equipments and parts of vehicles.
