MORTON MAKES ESTIMATES

Secretary of Navy Tells What He Needs from Congress Next Year.

CONSIDERABLE INCREASE OVER YEAR AGO

Over \$13,000,000 More Desired for New Ships and Equipment Than Was Anked for Last

Time.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 .- The naval estimates for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1906, aggregate \$114,500,638, an increase of \$17,372,446 over the last appropriation. The estimate for the Navy department proper is \$768,610,

The following are the principal items in the estimate: Pay of the navy, \$20,000,000; pay, miscellaneous, \$600,000; contingent, navy, \$65,000; bureau of navigation, \$1,779,-759; bureau of ordnance, \$5,103,506; bureau of equipment, \$6,724,228; bureau of yards and docks, \$6,764,030; public works, secretary of the navy (Naval academy), \$1,945,000; public works, bureau of navigation, \$156,900; public works, bureau of ordnance, \$504,500; public works, bureau of medicine and surgery, \$273,000; bureau of supplies and accounts, \$5,883,932; bureau of construction and repairs, \$8,410,024; bureau of steam engineering, \$4,322,720; Naval academy, \$349,675; marine corps paymaster, \$2,593,596; quartermaster, \$2,412,296. The estin tes for the pay of the navy is an increase of \$675,095 over the last appropriation. Under public works, bureau of yards and docks, \$4,157,000 represents new Items.

Following are the total estimates under the head of "increase of the navy": Construction and machinery, \$30,410,833; armor and armament, \$14,000,000; equipments, \$845 .-000. These involve an increase of \$13,428,973 over the last appropriation.

Along the estimates under yards and docks are the following for the navy yards named:

Guantanamo, \$275,000; League Island, \$597, 500; Mare Island, \$280,000; New York, \$999,-200; Olongapo, Philippine islands, \$120,000; Portsmouth, N. H., \$565,900; Puget sound, \$385,500; San Juan, \$416,000; Washington. \$328,300. Of the total of these amounts \$4. 157,000 is for new items, \$136,400 being for Mare Island, \$179,500 for Puget sound.

Under public works, bureau of surgery \$200,000 is estimated for the Naval hos pital, Norfolk, and \$50,000 for the Naval hospital at Pensagola. Of the estimates for the bureau of supplies and accounts \$5,-220,000 is for provisions for the navy, an Increase of \$370,000. An estimate of \$200,000 is made for equipping navy yards for the onstruction of vessels.

HENRY GAVER PLEADS GUILTY Man Who Killed James Rainbolt on Rosebud is Sentenced for Manslaughter.

ABERDEEN, S. D., Nov. 19 .- (Special.)lenry Gaver, indicted for the murder of William Rainbolt on the Rosebud reserva tion in October, who at first pleaded not guilty to the indictment, this morning appeared before the federal court and asked permission to change his plea from not guilty to guilty of manslaughter. The ples was accepted by the court and Judge Carland sentenced Gaver to three years in the penitentiary at Sloux Falls. United States Attorney Elliott stated that in his opinion the killing of Rainbolt was unpremeditated, and in view of this statement the

light sentence was imposed. Other sentences were imposed as follows: George LaBelle, convicted of selling liquor to Indians, sixty days in the Roberts inty tall and s prosecution; August Rosenbush, convicted of the same offense, given the same sentence; Edwin J. Emery, destroying a fence enclosing United States property on the Lower Brule reservation, a fine of \$10 or five days in the Brule county jail; Thomas and John Sands, stealing horses from Mrs. Use As a Shield on the Standing Rock reservation, one year and six months in the penitentiary at Sloux Falls. Little Warrior, larceny of a horse, one year and six months in the Sloux Falls penitentiary; Ben Hungry, seiling liquor to Indians, three months in the Hughes county jail and a

fine-of \$100 and costs. The plea of guilty to manslaughter made by Gaver will shorten the term of court considerably, as his trial was expected to take up several days' time. The calendar is cleared, with the exception of a few civil sults, and the court will complete its labors

DEER HUNTING IN BLACK HILLS Same Said to Be More Plentiful Than

in Years. SIOUX FALLS, S. D., Nov. 19 .- (Special.)-Reports from various portions of the Black Hills are to the effect that the opening of the deer shooting season on the 15th inst. found scores of hunting parties organized and ready for the sport of hunting and shooting these animals. All reports agree that deer are more numerous than for years and rare sport is anticipated during the open season.

During the closed season there were practically no attempts made to kill the animals and violate the law, and the result was that on the opening day of the open eason deer, in addition to being unusually iumerous, were also quite tame. One of the favorite resorts for deer is what is known as the Cold Springs region, and it was to that part of the Black Hills that many of the hunters proceeded at the opening of the season.

The timber in the Black Hills is more open than that in the deer hunting sections of Wisconsin and Minnesota, and there is little fear of hunters being killed through being mistaken for deer or by stray bullets, thus making the hunting of deer much safer than in the other two states named.
