HARLAN AND AVOCA PARTIES INTERESTED

Grape Growers' Association Also Has a Project for Handling Fruit Under Consideration.

In its reaching out for new industries the Commercial club is hopeful of landing in the near future a canning factory for Counell Bluffs. Overtures have been made to the clue by parties interested in canning view to locating a similar establishment The men interested in the canning factories are to meet with the executive committee of the Commercial club Tuesday when it is hoped some defigite arrangement will be reached. The Commercial club has received several propositions from parties desiring to establish such a factory here, but it is believed that made by the Harlan and Avoca people will be the most likely to lead to

When the matter of the location of a canning factory was before the Commercial club about a year ago it was suggested that the plant belonging to the Smith Refining company, which was formerly a canning factory, could be secured for the purpose. Since then, however, experts have given their opinion that it would be best to construct an entirely new factory as the machinery in the Smith plant is antiquated. This phase of the question, however, will come up for discussion at the conference Tuesday.

The Council Bluffs Grape Growers' Shipping association, composed of the leading fruit growers of this city and vicinity, is also considering a proposition for the establishment of a cauning factory here. The proposition to the Grape Growers' association comes from a firm manufacturing canning factory supplies. Members of the association are said to favor organtzing a local company with a capitalization of \$15,000 to establish a factory with a capacity of 50,000 cans daily. Such a factory would, it is contended, be a decided advantage to the fruit growers of this vicinity, as in seasons when fruit cannot be shipped with profit it could be turned into the canning factory without loss. It is understood that the question of forming a local company is to be decided by the association this week.

RACE TROUBLES AT FRASER

Shooting of White Miner by Colored Man Cause of Bitter Feeling.

WHITES REFUSE TO WORK WITH NEGROES

Posses Scouring Country for Man Whe Did the Shooting and Lynching Likely to Occur if He is

Captured.

DES MOINES, Nov. 20 .- Race war is re garded as imminent at Fraser, Ia., where Thomas Albright, a white miner, was last night shot and mortally wounded by James Price, a negro. The white miners held s meeting this afternoon and voted to refuse work longer with the negroes. They accuse the negroes with having nided Price to make his escape, and feeling is intense There are from thirty-five to fifty negroes in the mining camp and about 1,200 whites. Both sides are heavily armed.

A negro, thought to be Price, was seen near Ogden, seven or eight miles from Fraser, this evening. He answered the description of the wanted man, and on seeing that he was discovered, concealed himself in a cornfield. A posse from Ogder is searching for him and another body of niners from Ogden is working down the river in that direction, while still another body is making a thorough search of all the negro buts in Fraser. If the man is caught, it is believed the

The latest discovery of those who are still fighting the amendment is that from the de cription or introductory statement, which was printed with the amendment, in which its purpose is stated the words "of the state of Iowa" were omitted. The description simply refers to "the constitution," and it is now claimed that this is a fatal defect.
