TOY RAILROAD IN COURT Novel Method Used to Explain a Car Coupler Case to the Supreme Court Justices.

Is a locomotive tender a car within the meaning of the car coupler act? That is the question which the supreme court of pound of moderately fat beef, sirioin steak, the United States will have to decide in a case argued before it a few weeks ago. The act provides that within certain periods certain percentages of the locomotives and cars of all railroads in the United States which are engaged in interstate com merce shall be equipped with automatic couplers, but nothing is said about the tenders of the locomotives. This point was raised by counsel for the Southern Pacific Railroad company in a suit brought in Utah by W. O. Johnson, a brakeman, who in attempting to couple a locomotive and a dining car with a link and pin had his hand so badly mashed that it had to be amputated.

Johnson sued for \$30,000 damages. He was nonsuited, the trial judge holding that the locomotive tender, being neither a car nor a locomotive, was not required by the car coupler act to be equipped with an automatic coupler. He held also that as the dining car to which Johnson was coupling the tender was on a siding and not in use it was not then in Interstate commerce. and that the fact that the car was equipped with an automatic coupler which did not couple with the tender automatically was not material.

This judgment was affirmed by the circuit court of appeals. Johnson, at the instance of the Interstate Commerce commission, brought the case to the supreme court. The chief interest of the commission in the case is that if the judgment were allowed to stand the effect of the car coupler act would be practically destroyed. While the act makes no distinction as to the style of automatic coupler with which the cars and engines are to be equipped, most of the railroads have adopted the Janney, or M. C. B. coupler, which was recommended by a convention of master car builders of the various roads. The South-Herald, ern Pacific, however, adopted the Miller coupler, which does not work automatically with the M. C. B. coupler and consequently when it becomes necessary to couple cars

equipped with different couplers, an old fashioned link and pin must be used. It is asserted by the Interstate Commerce commission that coupling odd couplers with the link and pin is more dangerous than where both cars have the old link and pin coupler, and if the roads are permitted to use couplers which do not act automatically with each other, the law is practically a dead letter so far as its effect is

concerned. It, therefore, intervened in the suit for danuages instituted by Johnson, and Solicitor General Hoyt, on behalf of the commission, took part in the arguments in the case. An interesting feature of the argument

was the introduction of a working, model of cars equipped with the different couplers. The cars were each about two feet long and ran along a miniature section of rallroad track placed on the desk in front of the justices.

While the operation of the couplers was being explained the justices at the far ends of the bench left their chairs and gathered around the models, watching with interest the process of coupling -New York Sun. .


