Thanksgiving day promises to be one in which the holiday maker may find whatever sort of pleasure he is looking for. The churchman and the sporting enthusiast, the quiet home man and the theatergoer, may each find his sort of amusement well provided in the list of Thanksgiving events.
The "early bird" of a person, as it were, may find what he or she desires at the sunrise prayer meeting in the First Presbyterian church, where the Christian Endeavorers of the city are to gather for the first Thanksgiving of the day. Later come the solemn high masses of the Catholic churches and the services in the Episcopalian churches. Then the big union services in the evangelist churches, where three, four or five congregations are to join in united worship, and the particularly bounteous Thanksgiving time.

Big Union Services.
In the First Methodist church, for the downtown churches, Rev. Hubert C. Herding of the First Congregational, will conduct the service for the congregations of Kountze Memorial, First Presbyterian, First Congregational, First Christian, Central United Presbyterian and the First Methodist church. For the Hanscom park district Rev. T. V. Moore of Westminster Presbyterian church will preach in the First Baptist for the people of those two churches and Grace Lutheran, St. Mary's Avenue Congregation and Hanscom Park Methodist in Walnut Hill Methodist Episcopal church Rev. A. S. C. Clarke of the Lowe Avenue Presbyterian will address the congregations of Lowe Avenue Presbyterian, Clinton Hill and Benson Presbyterian and of the Walnut Hill Methodist churches. Seward Street Methodist Episcopal church will be the place of another union service, Rev. Newman Hall Burdick preaching to the people of that church, of his own, the Second Presbyterian and of Calvary Baptist. The south side churches—Castellar Street Presbyterian, South Street Methodist and Grace Baptist—will unite at the last of the three churches and will hear a sermon from Rev. Walter H. Reynolds. The hour for this service is 11 o'clock.

Many dinners will mark the day in the various hospital and charitable homes. These, however, largely will be of a private nature for the inmates and patients and will not be large public affairs, as has sometimes been the case. The Young Men's Christian association will dine its members who are living far from home in a strange place and may not have a slice of the paternal turkey.
Two Foot Ball Games.
The foot ball enthusiasts are promised a choice of much excellence. At the Vinton Street park the Creighton eleven will contest with the team of the Iowa State Normal. The other Omaha team, that of the Omaha Commercial college, will play the Dodge Light Guards in the Auditorium. This is something of a novelty, as foot ball under a roof has never been seen in this city. The commercial team has won two games here and the Dodge Light Guards are practically the same team as last year. The theatergoers may choose between the irrepressible Williams and Walker and their musical show, the moral lesson to be derived from a dramatic presentation of the liquor question and the good vaudeville.
