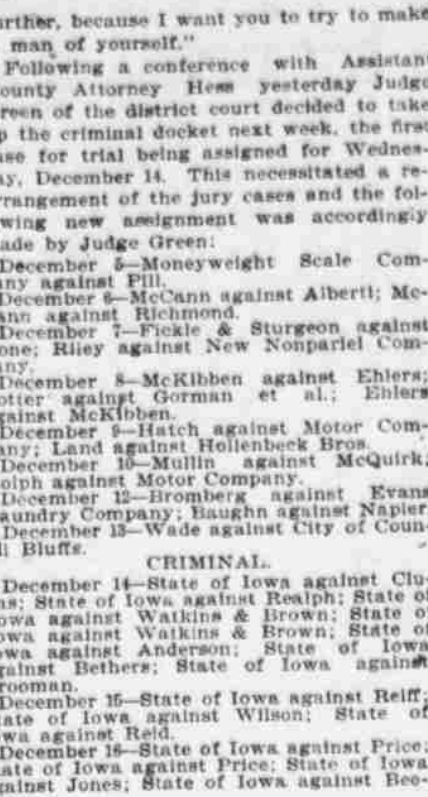
Baby Burned to Death.
