MUST STOP SPITTING ON SIDEWALKS Ordinance Now in Effect and Will Be Enforced.

Erected Years Ago as Seminary and Occupied by One Woman.

KNOXVILLE, Ia., Dec. 11-(Special.)-The old seminary, around which there has been a veil of mystery for twenty years, was completely destroyed by fire at o'clock Sunday morning.
