COUNCIL BLUFFS

SNOW SHOVELS ORDERED OUT

Property Owners and Occupants Must Keep the Sidewalks Cleared.
WEST ENDERS PRESENT PAVING PETITION
Desire to Have City and County Pay for Paving of Fifty-Foot Strip on West Broadway-Petition is Filed.

The city council last night by a unanimous vote decided to sustain the mayor and chief of police in rigidly enforcing the ordinance relating to the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks by owners or occupants of abutting buildings or lots.

Rev. Henry De Long, in his dual official capacity of probation officer of the juvenile division of the district court and trustee of the school district, asked that the curfew ordinance be resurrected and enforced on and after January 1.

Arthur Baxter and Raymond Hall, the boys charged with the theft of the pocketbook of Miss G. Hough while the latter was shopping Saturday evening in Front street, were taken before Judge Green yesterday morning in the juvenile division of the district court.

Relative to the paving of West Broadway the following resolution, adopted by the West End Improvement club, was presented and was ordered filed without comment:

That the paving of Broadway, fifty feet wide from the Indian creek bridge west to the bridge approaches, is of the first importance to the welfare of the city and is a thoroughfare for the people of the city and the county.

On motion of Alderman Weaver it was decided to place \$3,000 insurance on the Indian creek bridge.
