Twenty-Six Degrees Below Zero Lowest Temperature Reported in State.


TWELVE DEGREES BELOW ZERO IS COMMON

In South Dakota, Just Across the Nebraska Line, a Minimum of Thirty Degrees Below is Reported.

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., Jan. 13 - (Spe. ciai Telegram.)-Following the heavy snowfall of the 11th the weather here has turned extremely cold. At 7 a. m. the thermometer registered 22 below and has remained around 20 below all day, and the indications are at 7 p. m. that it will be colder and the temperature fall lower than last night There will be considerable suffering among stock in certain localities, as the weather has been so mild all winter that a great many people owning stock have not yer brought them in from the hill pastures and otherwise provided for their care. There has been no wind for three days and ranchmen who depend on windmills to draw the water supply for their stock are being brought face to face with a water famine. and if the weather does not change soon there will be lesses of stock for want of

Indeed, he had but recently been released from a Council Bluffs sanitarium.
