TAX FIGHT IS NOT GIVEN UP

Real Estate Exchange Committee Says it is Earnest and Active.

SAUNDERS AND CLARKE SURPRISE OMAHANS

Local Men Expected Legislators to Redeem Campaign Fledges Without Pressure from Their Constituents.

We have not given up the fight for a law that will permit local authorities to assess railway terminals and property other than the right-of-way," said W. G. Estate exchange when asked about the matter in connection with the statements of Douglas county legislators that they were waiting upon Omaha organizations before proceeding. Surprised at Statements.

"I am somewhat surprised at the statements of Senator Saunders and Representative Clarke, as we of the Real Estate exchange had been looking forward to con-siderable independent effort toward railway taxation reform from these two members, as well as from Representatives Anderson, Dodge and Milken, who were nominated and elected upon a platform expressly declaring for the local assessment of railway terminals. Just why, after being elected with such promises in their mouths, these legislators should stand aside and wait for instructions from their constituents is not quite clear to me. It seems to me that we have the right to expect independent initiative action from them without waiting for any urging from the Real Estate exchange or any other civic body in Omaha.

"The tax committee does not intend to let the matter languish, and if these gentlemen do not see fit to proceed on their own responsibility we shall take up the attempt to have the laws changed so that the rallway terminals in Omaha and other cities may be taxed in conformity with the other property and made to pay their just burdens of the revenue necessary for the local governments."

Sentiments of Others.

According to other members of the committee they have been waiting for a favorable opening in the legislature before pressing the taxation reform matter, and is indefinite just when the matter will be taken up. Like Mr. Ure, they expressed surprise over the statements of Saunders and Representative Clarke and are at a loss to understand why | Heavy all wool Scotch Goods with satin these and other Douglas county representatives should deem it at all necessary to stand aside and wait for pressure from Omaha. They had hoped that the railway tax fight would be taken up, as promised by the legislators mentioned, without any demands from the Real Estate exchange, which already has spent considerable money in the fight and is now disposed to play a waiting rather than an aggressive campaign.


