These articles provide for the establishment of a law library, to be located in rooms at Creighton university These rooms will be furnished free by the university and will be heated and lighted. They will comprise dictation, reading, toilet oms, etc. The university is to take one quarter of the stock to be issued-that is, paid up stock; but it will be exempt from all dues on said stock, in return for the




