Report of Game Warden.

State Fish and Game Commissioner Carter has completed his biennial report the governor showing that during the last bjennium the department has cost \$30,-245.02 for maintenance. During the same period the income of the department was \$14,280.43, leaving a net amount of \$5,986.55 to be contributed from the general fund in excess of the amount turned over by the commission. The discrepancy is due to the fishery at South Bend, which cost about \$3,000, without bringing in much of a financial return to the state treasury Mr. Carter estimates that the game protection department has turned into the treasury

\$2,000 in excess of the cost of maintenance. During the biennium the officials of the department have made 178 arrests and secured 142 convictions. Six cases were appealed by the defendants. Seven provided for jail sentences and in twenty-three cases there were acquitals. During the same period the wardens made many forays and captured seventy-six nets, which were destroyed; 20 other illegal devices, 1,462 prairie chickens, quail and ducks and 250 fish. Of the game birds, 752 were distributed to the charitable institutions of the state, while 60 were distributed under the provisions of the federal laws by the United States marshal at Chicago, who
