

"The original statute of 1738 provided that the giving of notice before, granting the temporary restraining order. The bill in-

troduced by Representative Jenkins restores that provision of the rule which requires that due notice must be given to the adverse party in all labor cases before the writ may issue. Its effect will be not to limit the right of injunction, but it will prevent the improvident granting of writs
