

LOBBY MUCH IN EVIDENCE

Old-Time Legislative Workers Are Keeping in the Background.

NEW FACES GREET THE LEGISLATORS

Members Called to See Railroads—One Gives a Ride in a Special Car by a General Manager.

LINCOLN, Jan. 28.—Newly-elected Governor Miley's domination of the lobby, notwithstanding the legislature was supposed to have been organized without the assistance of the lobby or corporate influences and not without statements by prominent members of the legislature that the lobby would not be tolerated.

The railroad, so far as outside appearances go, are doing nothing, but they are working just the same. Instead of the railroads coming to Lincoln to do business with the legislators, the railroads are having the legislators come to them.

Bridge Men on Deck.

The usual bridge lobby is here, it is claimed, with the intention of killing the Kyd bill, evidently having given up the idea of knocking out the county engineers bill, which has already passed the senate.

The Nebraska Telephone company and the independent companies have the lobby here they had two years ago, and so far no telephone legislation has been introduced in either house.

Brewers and Temperance Advocates.

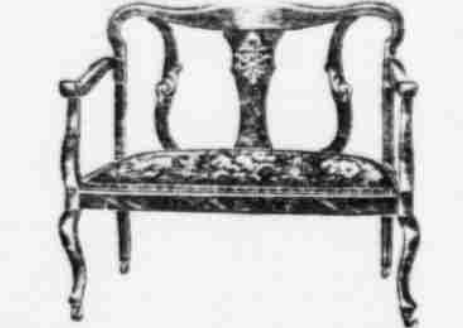

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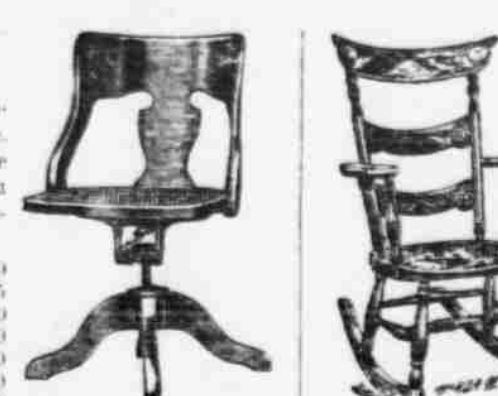

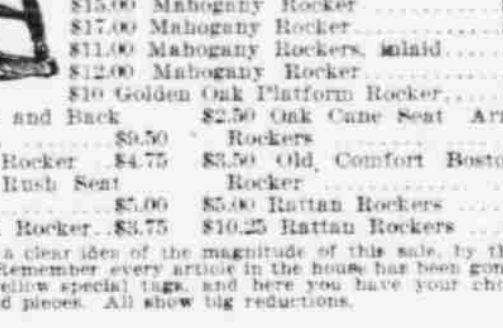
