Effect the Tariff War Between Railroads Has Had on Markets.

CORN GAINS FULLY CENT A BUSHEL Rise in Price on Local Market in

Steady and Sure with a Showing of Strength at Present.

The rate reductions consequent to the fight between the eastern and the southern exporting cities for Nebraska grain have already caused an advance on corn in the Omaha market of about I cent. Other causes may have contributed to this advance to a slight extent, but it is at least three-fourths of 1 cent greater than the general advance in corn prices in the Inited States would seem to justify,

The Omaha cash corn market Friday closed higher than it has been for almost iwo months, or since December 1. The later decline was, of course, due to the duliness and weakness of the general corn situation. The recent advance cannot be attributed to the slight cents; on the 16th, the day before it Galveston and Port Arthur. became public, the market was 89% cents; on the 20th, when the fight was well on, it copped to 3% cents; the next day it sold for 28% cents; the 23d, at 80 cents; the 25th. at 39% cents; the 18th, at 46 cents, and Fri-

JUVENILE COURT LAW

Determine on Changes. GOES AFTER PARENTAL DELINQUENTS

Home Influence to Be Made Responsible for Children and Probation Officers for Omaha to Be Given Salaries.

The joint committee representing the Real Estate Exchange, the Woman's club, the Woman's Christian Temperance union and the Douglas county bar association met yesterday afternoon in the city hall and agreed on certain additional provisions for the juvenile criminal court bill which they hope will become a law during this session of the legislature. H. W. Pencock will go down to Lincoln Monday morning to confe with Senator Mockett for the incorporation of the ideas of Judge Lindsey of the Denver child's court in the Nebraska bill. The Lincoln and the Omahs people are united in wishing to obtain a aw along the lines of Mr. Lindsey's suggestion, and senate file No. 6 which was introduced by Mr. Mockett is now found not to contain at

least two of these ideas. The principal thing to be insisted on in the new bill will be the responsibility of parents and other persons who may have een found to have contributed in any way to the delinquence of children. The bill will provide for such upon conviction a fine of not more than \$1,000 or imprisonment for not more than a year or both. These penalties may be conditioned and finally waived upon the promise of proper conduct on the part of the parent or other person. The first bill did not provide for any delinquence on the part of parents.

#### Pay for Probation Officers.

The second most important addition will be a salary for the probation officer. The first bill provided for services without compensation but the new one following the suggestions of Judge Lindsey provides for a salary of \$1,200 with an allowance of expenses up to \$500 annually. This is for unties having a population of 100,000. There is to be a probation officer and an assistant (one a woman) and the pay of the assistant will be left to the discretion of the authorities.

## PENSION DAY IN THE HOUSE

Three Hundred and Seventy-Five Bills

Passed in Less Than Two Hours.

Sixteen Addresses of Eulogy Delivered in the Upper House in

Honor of Massachusetts Statesman. WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.-In a session of

less than two hours today the house passed

373 pension bills and received for the calen-

dar the naval and diplomatic appropriation bills. The rest of the session was devoted to legislation devoid of discussion. The naval and diplomatic and consular appropriation bills were reported to the house today.

A senate bill incorporating in the District of Columbia the trustees of the grand encampment of Knights Templar of the United States was passed.

A resolution was agreed to authorizing the Department of Commerce and Labor to investigate the iron and steel industry NOTION STORE BURNED OUT in the United States. The house then took p private pension legislation.
