Provisions Made by the Statutes of Various States Governing the Matter.

The committee of women having in charge the matter of securing an amendment to the Nebraska statutes, dealing with the descent of property, has prepared the fellowing synopsis of the laws of descent of different states as affecting the surviving husband or wife:

Iowa-The surviving husband or wife takes one-third of all the legsl and equitatakes one-third of all the legal and equitable estates in real property in fee simple, possessed by the husband or wife at any time during the marriage, which has not been sold on execution or other judicial sale and to which the survivor had not relinquished his or her right. (This interest is not subject to the payment of debts existing at the time of the death. Sec. 226, Code of lowa, 1887.).

The personal property but necessary for The personal property not necessary for the payment of debts nor otherwise dis-

the payment of debts nor otherwise dis-posed of is distributed to the same per-sons and in the same proportions as real estate. (Sec. 2362, Code of lows, 1897.). The survivor's share above provided for cannot be affected by any will of the spouse unless consent thereto is given within six months after a copy thereof

spouse unless consent thereto is given within six months after a copy thereof has been served upon the survivor. (Sec. 2376, Code of Iowa, 1897.)

Kansas—One-half in value of all the real estate in which the husband at any time during the marriage had a legal or equitable interest, which has not been sold on execution or other judicial sale, and not necessary for the payment of debts, and of which the wife made no conveyance, shall, under the direction of the probate court, be set apart by the executor as her property, in fee simple, upon the death of her husband, if she survives him, etc. (Sec. 250, Gen. Stat. of Kansas, 1991). If the intestate leave no issue, the whole of his estate shall go to his parents. (Sec. 252, id.) The personal property of the decased not necessary for the payment of debts, nor otherwise disposed of according to law, shall be distributed to the same persons and in the same proportions as though it were real estate. (Sec. 252, id.)

All the provisions heretofore made in relation to the widow of a deceased husband shall be applicable to the husband of a deceased wife, etc. (Sec. 252, id.)

Colorado—Real and Personal Estate—If such intestate leave a husband or wife and children, or the descendants of children, him or her surviving, one-half of such es-

children, or the descendants of children, him or her surviving, one-half of such estate shall descend to such surviving husband or wife, and the residue thereof to such surviving children and descendants of children as hereinafter limited. If such intestate leave a husband or wife, and no child nor descendants of any child, then the whole of the estate of such intestate, real and personal, shall descend and vest in such surviving husband or wife as his or her absolute estate, subject to the payment of debts aforesaid (Mills' Annotated Statutes of Col., vol. 1, 1891, Sec. 1524.)

Wyoming—Whenever any person having title to any real estate or property having

Wyoming-Whenever any person having title to any real estate or property having the nature and legal character of real estate, or personal estate undisposed of or otherwise limited by marriage settlement, shall die intestate as to such estate, it shall descend and be distributed in parcenary to his kindred, male and female, subject to the payment of his debts, in the following course and manner, namely: If such intestate leave a husband or wife and children, or the descendants of any children him or her surviving, one-half of such estate shall descend to such surviving husband or wife, and the residue thereof such estate shall descend to such surviving husband or wife, and the residue thereof to such surviving children and descendants of children as hereinafter limited. If such intestate leave a husband or wife and no child nor descendants of any child, then the real and personal estate of such intestate shall descend as follows: Three-fourths thereof to such surviving husband or wife and one-fourth thereof to the father and mother of the intistate or the survivor of them; provided, that if the estate of such intestate, real and personal, does not exceed \$10.000, and such intestate does not exceed \$10,000, and such intestate

"If a man die intestate leaving a widow, one-third of his personal estate shall descend to said widow, subject, however, to its proportion of the debts of said decedent." (Sec. 2483, a. ld.)

"If a wife die testate or intestate, leaving a widower, one-third of hor real estate shall descend to him, subject, however, to its proportion of the debts of the wife contracted before marriage." (Sec. 2485, Id.)
