LAW OF DESCENT OF PROPERTY

Provisions Made by the Statutes of Various States Governing the Matter. The committee of women having in charge the matter of securing an amendment to the Nebraska statute dealing with the descent of property, has prepared the following synopsis of the laws of descent of different states as affecting the surviving husband or wife.

Illinois.—The surviving husband or wife takes one-third of the real and personal estate in fee simple, and if there be children, he or she takes one-third of the real estate in fee simple, and one-third of the personal estate.

Kansas.—One-half in value of all the real estate in which the husband at any time during the marriage has acquired an interest, which has not been sold on execution or other judicial sale, and not necessary for the payment of debts, and of which the wife made no conveyance, shall, under the direction of the probate court, be sold for the benefit of the surviving husband or wife.

Missouri.—The surviving husband or wife takes one-third of the real and personal estate in fee simple, and if there be children, he or she takes one-third of the real estate in fee simple, and one-third of the personal estate.

Nebraska.—The surviving husband or wife takes one-third of the real and personal estate in fee simple, and if there be children, he or she takes one-third of the real estate in fee simple, and one-third of the personal estate.
