OLD ENGINE AT IOWA COLLEGE

Daughter of Mrs. Mallory Donates Old

Type of Locomotive to School. AMES, In., Feb. 4.--(Special.)-The mechanical engineering department at the Iowa State college has recently received an addition to its museum collection in the form of an old and ancient type of a locomotive. It comes as the gift of Mrs. Jesse Mallory Thayer of Chariton, Ia., and was donated without expense to the college in any form. Early in the fall President A. B. Storms received a communication from Mrs. Thayer offering the engine to the college if they had a suitable place to put it.

The engine is unlike any type that is in use today and is a curiosity. The engine is three feet, narrow gauge, Porney type, having outside valve motion and the driving wheels and cylinder on a truck separate from the boiler, which is contrary to more recent methods of construction. It is equipped with the old fashloned funnel stack, small drivers and tenders and a headlight seemingly out of all proportion to its weight. It is in bad condition, the woodwork being rotted and smashed and the metal rusted in spots, but a comparatively small expense in the repairing and paint which it will receive will add much
