CZAR'S MEN DRIVEN BACK

Outposts Along Center of Line Forced to Retire Two Miles.

RUSSIANS ABANDON SHAKHE BRIDGE

Japs Begin Turning Movement on Both Flanks and Artillery Firing Continues.

KOUROPATKIN'S POSITION IS CRITICAL

One of Kuroki's Columns Seen Working Around Extreme

RUMOR THAT RETREAT IS IN PROGRESS

Reports in Circulation at St. Petersburg Say Withdrawal of Stores to Tie Pass Has Already Begun.

MUKDEN, March 1.—(Delayed in Transmission.)—Today was marked by attacks along the whole front.

The fighting in the center is becoming serious. After an all-night Japanese bombardment of Poutloff hill and Novgorod hill, involving a liberal rain of heavy projectiles, the Japanese infantry this morning advanced against the Russian lines from the hills and drove back the advance positions two miles.

The advance was unopposed until the Japanese reached within 100 yards of the main line of trenches, when they were beaten off by the fire of machine guns and volleys of rifle fire. When they retired the Japanese left five men dead and wounded.

Bahapu, Shantapan, Chahantan, Chandipa and other positions of the Russian center were also subjected to a heavy bombardment by siege guns. The Russian artillery, which was silent February 28, accepted the challenge today and a vigorous artillery duel in progress.

The Russians have abandoned the Shakhe river bridge entirely, taking up their former positions. The losses on both sides have been heavy.

Russian cavalry has been dispatched northwestward in the direction of Kalama to interpose a barrier against the attack of the Japanese columns advancing from the Liao river valley.

Japs Nearing Mukden.

NEW CHIVANG, March 2.—(Nooon.)—(Via Tien Tsin.)—Chinese from Mukden report that the Japanese have advanced almost to Mukden. The Russians, having been reinforced, have recaptured several positions out of which they had been driven. The battle is still raging.

The Japanese bivouacking on the outskirts of Simintsin withdrew this morning, leaving only a picket.

The Russian position at Changtiao has been reinforced. Strings of Chinese carts are moving toward Mukden. Foreigners are still at Mukden.

Stubborn Fight on Left Wing.

SAKHETUN, Manchuria, Wednesday, March 1.—A stubborn fight is waging on the left wing. Vigorous attacks of the Japanese on the village of Kudaza have been repulsed and the Russian maintained their position, thanks to the intervention of a relief column, which attacked the Japanese from the west after two passes had been occupied. This column was hard pressed by the Japanese and suffered great losses. It advanced in detachments to the neighborhood of benapuu, where it was attacked three times during the night, at 11 o'clock, midnight and 3 a. m., but repulsed all the Japanese onslaughts.

To the westward the Japanese made a night attack on Kuntal pass. Some of the assaults were repulsed, but at 9 a. m. the Russian advance guard vacated two outworks, which had been destroyed by the Japanese artillery, and retired to adjacent and better fortified positions.

The Japanese attacked Nanehanpu, in Kuanliensien district, at 6 a. m., but were repulsed.

Kouropatkin's Position Critical

6 1/2 p. m. The position of General Kouropatkin's army is regarded as being more or less critical. The real turning movement which General Kuroki is operating in the mountains forty miles eastward of Mukden seems to be making progress, and at the same time Field Marshal Oyama is also rolling back the Russian left, while pounding away at the Russian center with heavy high-power guns. Poutloff and Novgorod hills have been subjected to a continual three-day bombardment, followed by an infantry attack, but a Japanese line being forced to retire two miles to their shelter trenches. Some of the Russian newspaper correspondents anticipate an attempt to take the hills by storm.

General Kouropatkin is making desperate efforts to check Kuroki, one of whose columns has succeeded in working around the extreme Russian left, and reinforcements have been dispatched in a north-easterly direction. General Rennenkampf is slowly retiring fighting, taking advantage of the hilly country and contesting every inch of ground.

While the Japanese are evidently making progress, there is nothing yet to indicate that Field Marshal Oyama will succeed in inflicting a decisive blow, even if he forces Kouropatkin to abandon Mukden.

Russians Begin Retreat

ST. PETERSBURG, March 2.—4 1/2 p. m.—According to the reports current, which are not, however, confirmed by the war office, the withdrawals of stores and supplies northward from Mukden is already well under way. The war office insists that no matter what the result of the remainder of the action, the Japanese have again been too slow and that Kouropatkin has made sure of his line of retreat. Except the moral effect of another retirement the war office officials declare that the abandonment of the present winter quarters eliminates a grave danger to the health of the army as a whole as the warm weather sets in.

A dispatch from General Kouropatkin dated March 1 says:

In a third attack on the Russian detachment at Poutloff, the main Russian line, charged with the bayonet and succeeded in occupying the central height, forcing the Russian to abandon it and retreat to the neighboring crest.

The Russians at 10 o'clock at night, February 29, were still holding a position near Knodtusa against the Japanese attack. The Japanese made a fresh attack on the Quato pass position at 3 o'clock in the morning of March 1. After repulsing several assaults the Russians were forced to abandon two outcrops, which had been demolished by the Japanese artillery.

General Kouropatkin reports that several Japanese attacks on Manahanpu on the Shakhe river in the morning of March 1 were repulsed and says the bombardment of Poutloff and Novgorod hills and the Russian position at Sandapa was occasioned.

BALFOUR MAJORITY FALLS OFF

Government Sustained by Only Twenty-Six Votes on Several Minor Matters.

LONDON, March 2.—The House of Commons tonight in committee on supply considering the additional army estimate with a reduced attendance gave the government a majority of only 26 on a minor amendment. The result of this division was received with an outburst of cheering by the opposition.

Mr. Lloyd-George (advanced liberal) immediately moved to report progress. He accused the government of filibustering in order to gain time and whip up the majority, thereby sacrificing the time of the house. He said it was evident that there was a split in the ministerial ranks and that the Commons were tired of Mr. Balfour and the ministry.

Premier Balfour, on replying, said that if the Commons were tired of him it was an easy matter to secure a riddance.

As a result of the vote the result being 157 to 121 in favor of the government. This majority of 24 was greeted with cries of "Resign."

In subsequent divisions the government majority hovered around 35 and 28 and the matter was the subject of excited comment in the lobby.
