Senate Passes Resolution Extending Present Act Governing Canal Zone.

HOUSE REFUSES TO YIELD A POINT

Bill Fails Because Senate Amendments Are Not Acceptable to the Representatives.

WASHINGTON, March 4 .- The senate to day found itself far less pressed than usual on the last day of a session of congress. All the appropriations having been passed the session was given up largely to genera legislation and when necessary to conference reports on appropriation bills. During day final reports were presented on the naval, the postoffice, the Indian and the sundry civil bills, leaving only the river and harbor and the general deficiency bills to be considered in their final stages. During the day the pure food bill was definitely displaced and a sharp colloquy over the incident occurred between Senators

McCumber and Lodge. The joint resolution continuing in force the present law applicable to the Panama canal zone was unanimously adopted, but not until after several senators had expressed themselves in frank language concerning the attitude of the house, to which they attributed the fallure of the conference on the bill.

It was Mr. Kittredge who called up his resolution for the continuance in force of the Spooner law relating to the isthmian canal, saying that the house conferees had refused to accept the senate provisions or any compromise, and had declared flatly that if the house bill was not accepted there could be no actual legislation during the present session.

number of other important cities their proportion ranges from 36 to 20 per cent of the total beef supplied. In smaller cities and towns in most sections of the country, on the other hand, and even in large cities in some sections, their operations are relatively much less important.

For instance,

or instance, such cities as Buffalo, Cleve For instance, such cities as Buffalo, Cleve-land, Cincinnati and Indianapolis, obtain only from 10 to 33½ per cent of their total beef supply from these six companies. In the southern states the large packers men-tioned generally supply less than half the total beef consumed in the larger cities and in the smaller cities and towns of this sec-tion the proportion is generally less than one-fourth. The six companies mentioned are almost all the concerns conducting op-erations over an extended area, slaughter-ing cattle in the great western markets and transporting the product eastward for con-sumption. Except for the beef supplied by them, nearly all is slaughtered by local con-cerns.

orns.

In order to make certain of the accuracy of the results, the bureau adopted a double method of ascertaining the profits. It first compiled from the detailed records of packing companies exact figures of the quantities, costs and sales of cattle and all products derived from them, and from these elements computed the profit of each of the packers separately and of all together. This computation was confined to the Armour. computation was confined to the Armour Swift and Schwarzschild & Sulzberger com

Profits on By-Products.

In addition to the average profits just indicated are the further profits arising from elaboration of by-products beyond the first marketable stage, and from car mileage, which, as already stated, may together add not more than 50 cents per head to the average profit of 99 cents just given. The additional profit derived from elaborating minor by-products is over and above their value as raw material, which is already included in the profits of the beef business. The great packing establishments have numerous auxiliary departments, some of which are virtually distinct industries not strictly belonging to the packing business. The profit on private refrigerator cars is that derived from the mileage paid by the railroads, which, roughly speaking, averages slightly more than % of a cent per mile for every mile traveled by refrigerator cars, whether loaded or empty. The average distance to which beef is transported from the packing house before consumption does not exceed 800 miles. The gross mileage received by the owner of the refrigerator car would therefore be roughly \$12 per round trip. The great packing establishments have

Companies Not Overcapitalized.

The actual quantity of dressed beef derived was ascertained directly from the killing records, and the actual amount received for such beef was also taken from the books. True averages were then determined with the results already indicated. An examination of the actual bookkeeping profits was made for Morris & Co. and the Cudahy Packing company, as well as for the three companies named. Extensive statistics of prices of cattle and beef and other matters was also taken from all five of these packers and from the Hammond company as well. As stated, the results of the bureau's investigation indicate that the larger, packing companies especially considered are not over-capitalized. Presumptive evidence in favor of fair capitalization is found in the very concentrated holdings of the stocks of these companies, nearly all of which, with the exception of Swift and Company, are held by the packers themselves and their families. In the case of Swift and Company the entire \$35,000,000 Companies Not Overcapitalized.

These profits are entirely derived from the mileage allowed owners of private cars by railroad companies. For refrigerator cars this mileage is generally three-fourths of 1 cent, but for a considerable section of the country is 1 cent per mile traveled.

The National Packing company, mentioned above as one of the "Big Six," is a merger of various packing plants, particu-

tioned above as one of the 'Hig Six,' is a merger of various packing plants, particu-larly the so-called Hammond and Fowler properties, and is controlled by Armour, Swift and Morris interests, who constitute its board of directors. Except for the Na-tional Packing company, however, there appears to be practically no general inter-ownership of stock among the six principal companies.

Mr. Mc-Nenny then brought an information in the nature of quo warranto and the case was tried to the court. The holding of the court is in effect that the resignation of Mc-Nenny was accepted during the first term and that as he had qualified for the second term within the time allowed by statute he was legally entitled to the office from the

date of the qualification. River Open at Yankton. YANKTON, S. D., March 3 .- (Special.)-The earliest break-up in the Missouri river at this point occurred last night and today. The ice for several miles above and below the city has been slowly breaking up for several days and today the river is running full of immense floes. The thickness of the ce is most unusual, due to the intense cold of the early part of February, but there is little or no danger of a gorge owing to the fact that the ice is no longer firm, but breaks readily. The Yankton Bridge and Ferry company lost some of its pontoon floats in the break-up, but succeeded in saving a majority of them. The river will be running free from ice and open to navi-

gation within a week.
